Netwomen fall to Princeton

The women's tennis team ended a rather successful spring dual match schedule in a rather unsuccessful way Saturday, The Lady Lions fell to Ivy League champ Princeton, a team which played almost flawless tennis, 8-1, in a match that produced at least one Penn State bright spot.

Despite Penn State's losing four of six singles matches in straight sets, plus two of three doubles in the tropical amount, two Lady Lions had reason to be happy about their performance as a team.

The No. 1 doubles' team of Carol Daniels and Sue Whiteside handed the outstanding Tigers' duo of Joy Cummings and Pia Tamayo a 6-4, 6-4 straight sets defeat. Cummings and Tamayo are the No. 1 seeded doubles' team for the Eastern Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women regionals, which will take place in Princeton, N.J. next weekend.

"They played awesome," Head Coach Kim Muller said of the tandem's play in the first set as they "just blew them off the court."

Penn State's top doubles pair was then

hit with a rash of streaky play, but the two regrouped and managed to stave off a Tiger comeback in what proved to be a very intense match.

"They (Daniels and Whiteside) know what doubles is all about," Muller said, "so they know how to play the game."

"They have really matured as a doubles' team," added Muller in regards to Daniels and Whiteside's play since being beaten by the doubles' team of Tamayo and Princeton's No. 3 singles player Jan Schellbue at the Eastern Collegiate in October.

This weekend's victory is expected to be an added plus for Daniels and Whiteside going into the EAIAW's, as most people are expecting a dandy of a first round at the Eastern.

Unfortunately for the Lady Lions, the rest of Saturday's match wasn't as nice, as only Daniels and No. 3 singles player King Muller took their opponents into the third set before being dropped.

Daniels was involved in the most exciting match of the day in her square-off with the doubles' team of Virginia Christy and Bill Plarid. In the doubles, the teams of Factor-Jon Whiteside, and Schillings-Christian also won.

After falling apart against Ohio Sunday, the Penn State lions put together in the afternoon and easily conquered Bowling Green, 8-1.

Schillings, Factor, Beckhard, Christian and Plarid won in singles play, and Beckhard, Factor, Whiteside and Schillings-Christian swept the doubles.

After a full weekend of tennis, Penn State is looking at what will be its busiest, and possibly most important week of the year. The team plays three matches this week: at home against Bucknell tomorrow, at home against Maryland on Wednesday and at Princeton on Saturday.

Lion spikers capture ECVL title

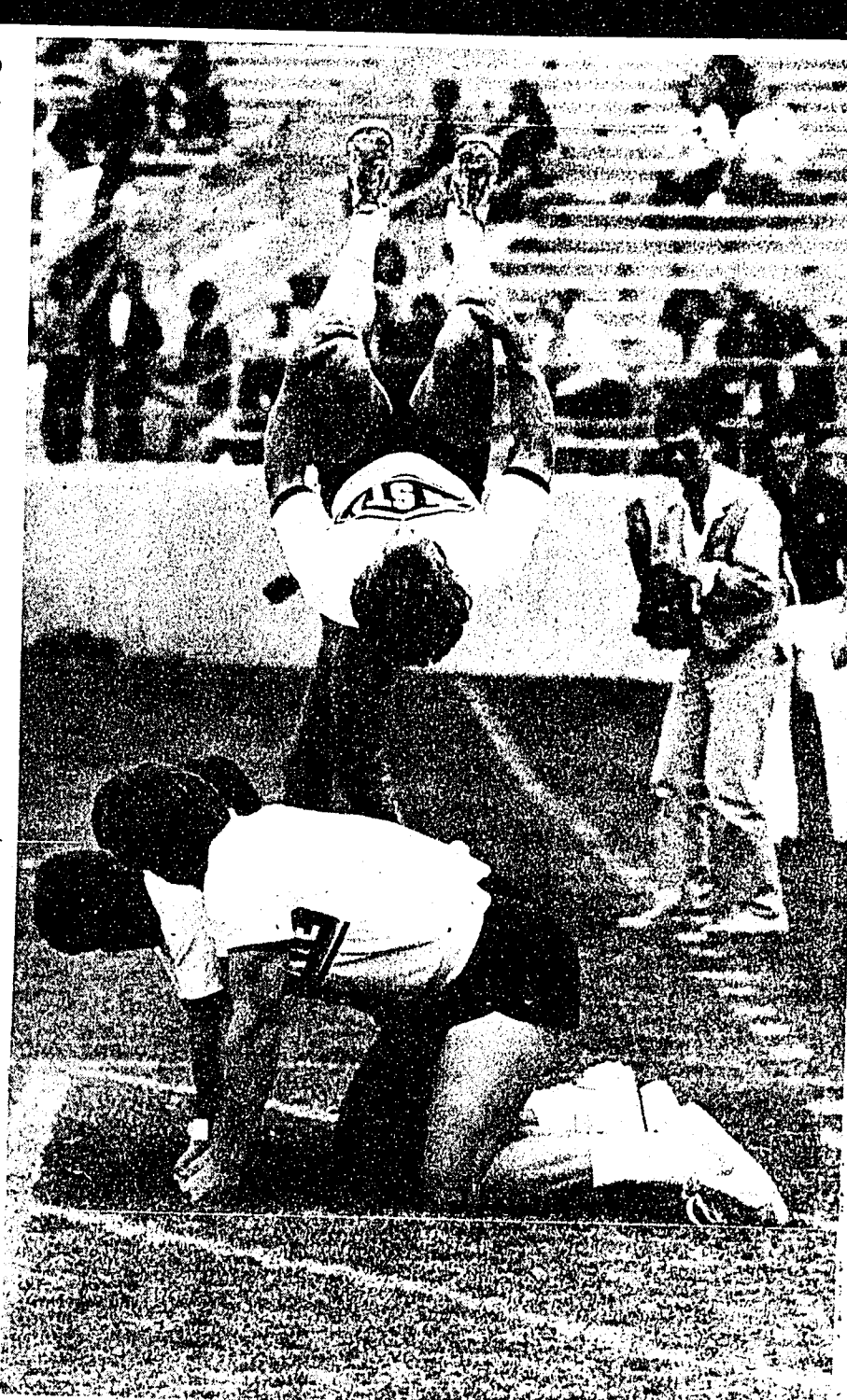
