

Women's soccer club earns tie

The women's soccer club opened its season Saturday against George Washington University at Pollock Field, starting its record off with a tie game of 2-2.

Laurie Jones was the first to score with a 35-yard goal, giving Penn State an early lead.

But not long afterwards, Heidi Vosbeck tied it up with a goal for the Lady Colonials. Vosbeck also made two more attempts, but Penn State goalie Patti Wisniewski was wide awake on defense, making quite a few saves throughout the game.

Offensively, the Lady Lions moved the ball well as a team and earned another goal by Meredith Wagner. However, Vosbeck, a tough offensive player, came back with a short-range goal that left the score 2-2 at the half.

Neither team had any success in scoring attempts in the second half, forcing the game into two 10-minute overtimes. Both teams constantly struggled for possession of the ball, but no one managed to take the lead.

"The first half was well played by both teams. I've never seen women play at this level," said Rich Kilgore, the new Lady Lions' coach.

Kilgore had been the men's soccer coach at Musking-

ham College in Ohio before coming to Penn State to work on his doctorate in management science. Arriving here only a week ago, he has just Penn State's 8-1 record from last year and the results of the opening game to determine the Lady Lions' ability.

"Our defense appeared strong, but our offense looked weak," Kilgore said. "Everyone did just enough to get by but didn't push themselves because they were tired and the heat was too much. It's unfortunate for us not to have pushed harder before the season began," he said.

"I thought we played really good considering we have a new coach and new players. I'm satisfied (with the game) because they're really an excellent team and we were expecting a good game," Wisniewski said.

Lady Colonials Coach Randy Horton was pleased with the game results.

"I'm satisfied with the performance of my team and I feel the results are a fair indication of the way the game was played," Horton said. He also added that he believes Penn State has the potential to be a varsity team.

The Lady Lions are referred to as a club team, but they are facing competition from four of the best varsity teams in the East this season with hopes of establishing themselves as a top competitor.

Parker returns to lift Pirates to win

PITTSBURGH (AP) — It didn't take Dave Parker long to get back into the swing of the National League East pennant race.

The Pittsburgh Pirates' right-fielder, on the disabled list since July 29, returned to the starting lineup yesterday and contributed three hits and two runs as the Pirates defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 4-2.

"I wasn't scared about playing again but I was nervous," said Parker, who now has four consecutive hits since coming off the disabled list. Parker had a pinch-hit triple Saturday in the Pirates' 10-9 victory over the Phillies.

He had hits in his first three plate appearances yesterday before leaving the game in the seventh inning with a blood blister on his foot.

"It's good to see Dave Parker swinging the bat again," said Pirates Manager Chuck Tanner. "He only had a couple of days of batting practice, but he was here running and he was in good shape."

Dale Berra lined a bases-loaded double in the sixth inning to break a 1-1 tie and give the Pirates a 4-1 lead. Winning pitcher Rick Rhoden, 10-12, pitched the first 6 2/3 innings and Kent Tekulve went the rest of the way for the save.

Mets 4, Cardinals 1
ST. LOUIS (AP) — Dave Kingman knocked in two runs with a single and a sacrifice fly, Brian Giles and Bruce Bochy smashed consecutive fourth-inning home

runs, and Pete Falcone fired a three-batter to lift the New York Mets to a 4-1 triumph yesterday over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Despite the loss, the Cards held on to first place in the National League East by a half-game over Philadelphia, which lost to Pittsburgh yesterday, 4-2. It was the Cards' sixth setback in nine games.

Falcone, 9-9, fanned four and walked two, losing his shutout bid in the ninth when Lonnie Smith led off with a walk, stole second, went to third when catcher Bochy threw the ball into center field for an error, and scored on Keith Hernandez' sacrifice fly to right field. Falcone then retired Ken Oberkell and Gene Tenace to end the game.

Falcone gave up singles to Smith and George Hendrick in the first and fourth innings and Hendrick's leadoff double in the seventh.

NFL season opens on schedule with surprises

Green Bay's Lynn Dickey stunned the Los Angeles Rams, Washington's Mark Moseley surprised the Philadelphia Eagles and Detroit's Billy Sims helped stop the Chicago Bears as the NFL's regular season opened on schedule yesterday.

The Rams, who missed the playoffs last season for the first time since 1972, used a sparkling performance by new quarterback Bert Jones in racing to a 23-0 halftime lead against Green Bay.

But the Packers pulled within 23-14 in the third quarter, and then Dickey threw two

touchdown passes 17 seconds apart in the fourth quarter as Green Bay rallied past the Rams 35-23.

In other games, Washington topped Philadelphia in overtime 37-34; Detroit beat Chicago 17-10; Cincinnati trounced Houston 27-6; Atlanta nipped the New York Giants 16-14; Buffalo got past Kansas City 14-9; St. Louis defeated New Orleans 21-7; Minnesota downed Tampa Bay 17-10; New England topped Baltimore 24-13; San Diego shut down Denver 23-3; Cleveland beat Seattle 21-7; Miami outscored the New York Jets 45-9; and the Los Angeles Raiders debuted with a 23-17 victory over the Super Bowl champion

San Francisco 49ers.

Pittsburgh will play in Dallas tonight. Teams exchanged handshakes before some games yesterday — as they had done during exhibition games — in a show of solidarity for the players' union against management. The handshakes were met with loud crowd boing.

While union officials last week said there would not be a league-wide strike of the openers, the chance of selective wildcat strikes was not eliminated until the Seattle Seahawks voted during mid-week to play against Cleveland.

Seattle players had been upset by the team's release of their player representative,

wide receiver Sam McCullum, on Tuesday. There were, however, nearly 9,000 no-shows at the Kingdome for the Seahawks-Browns game.

In Philadelphia, Moseley kicked a 48-yard field goal on the final play of regulation to tie the score at 34-34, and then booted a 26-yarder 4:47 into overtime as the Redskins beat the Eagles. The winning kick came on the first possession of overtime.

In Detroit, Sims — who was a preseason holdout and missed all of the Lions' exhibition games — carried 13 times for just 33 yards. But one of those rushes was a 3-yard touch-

down run in the fourth quarter as the Lions

downed the Bears.

Jim Plunkett threw a fourth-quarter touchdown pass and rookie Marcus Allen gained 116 yards and scored a touchdown as the Los Angeles Raiders — playing their first game since moving from Oakland — beat San Francisco. Super Bowl hero Joe Montana fired two scoring strikes for the 49ers.

Quarterback Ken Anderson completed 29 of 40 passes for 354 yards and two touchdowns and also ran for another score as defending American Football Conference champion Cincinnati shut down Houston. Earl Campbell ran 20 times for 82 yards for the Oilers.
