

AAUW brings together female college graduates

When a woman trades in her mortarboard for a briefcase, she does not have to lose the camaraderie she shared with other women during her college years.

The American Association of University Women, a 100-year-old organization with more than 100,000 members, gives female college graduates the opportunity to meet with other women who are climbing the ladder of success.

Established in 1881, the national AAUW was "founded to bring together women who had mutual interests who have graduated from college," said Louise Tuckey, a member and historian for the local AAUW.

The idea for an AAUW branch at the University was conceived in 1916 by the wife of

Gilbert Pond, the founder of the physics and chemistry departments.

However, at that time the University was not accredited and "only women from an accredited college or university could be members," Tuckey said.

Penn State had to fulfill three criteria before being allowed to form a branch of the association, Tuckey said.

First, the University's Board of Trustees had to include a female member. Second, the requirements stated that women students should have their own director of physical training. Finally, the University had to have a woman on the faculty who was a full professor.

In 1918, Lucretia Simmons was appointed the first woman to hold the position of a full professor and in 1926, Clara Phillips was appointed the first female trustee.

By then, the AAUW State College branch was on its way to becoming a fast-growing organization.

"It's the oldest and largest national organization," said Sarah Godbey, State College branch vice president and program chairman. "The AAUW is defined as a national network of 190,000 women who are college graduates. We have 1,900 branches, which includes the one in State College."

"For centuries, the members of AAUW have been committed to the advancement of women and the improvement of society. On every level, we're meeting challenges with responsible, effective involvement. Our opinions count and our decisions make a difference."

Local AAUW members say they believe in meeting the challenges through aiding the community. One such project is PhoneF-

riend, which began last January as a pilot project of the local AAUW, in conjunction with the Women's Resource Center of Centre County.

PhoneFriend is designed to give support to "atchkey" children — those children under the age of 13 who are left alone after school because their parents are working.

Helen Meahl, a family sociologist and local AAUW member, said each branch must submit an idea for a community aid project and submit that idea to the national branch in Washington, D.C. The most original and useful project is awarded national funding.

The PhoneFriend project, Meahl said, received the most money granted to any one project. The rest of the money needed for the project was raised through a book sale.

Meahl explained that PhoneFriend should not be used in place of the police or other

emergency help lines, but should be used by children who are alone at home.

Children call with questions about cooking, she said, or they ask how to clean a mess they or their pets have made, or they want to talk to someone without having to bother their parents.

"The local AAUW makes most of its money through fund-raising events. The biggest fund raiser is a book sale that last year raised more than \$15,000.

"The money we raise goes to educational projects," said Godbey. "We support the educational foundation program of the national AAUW, and they give awards primarily for post-doctoral work in the United States and abroad. Most of the money goes to the Educational Foundation Program."
