# NFL strike

## Eagles' Reggie Wilkes settling down for a long wait

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Reggie Wilkes awakened at 7:45 a.m. the same time he does every practice day, but on Wednesday was different. "It's funny, on the days I did have to go to practice I wanted to go back to sleep," said the Philadelphia Eagles' linebacker on this second day of the players' strike against the National Football League. "This morning I was alive, gung-ho. I was anxious to go to work," said Wilkes, a third-round draft choice of the Eagles in 1979. All of a sudden I realized there was no work to go to," Wilkes said somewhat sadly. "Frankly, it's boring. So Wilkes had breakfast with his wife, a fourth-year student at Temple University Medical School, then he left for the house three times during the morning — to pick up a newspaper, go to a record shop, and to purchase a movie cassette. Wilkes indicated he was settling in for a long strike.

# Grier returns to State with message

Instead of sacking quarterbacks, acting in movies, making television appearances, and doing newsprint, Rocky Grier has a new purpose in life — to serve and praise God.

Grier returned to Penn State to give his speech message. He spoke last night and Tuesday at the HUB Ballroom in a program sponsored by the Lamb Fellowship.

"I have only been back four times since I graduated (1969)," Grier said. "This time I feel I'm back for the right reason. One time I came back and they were holding hostages in the dormitories. I came here with Lamb Fellowship for the right reason. I feel I'm a big brother coming back to visit all my little sisters and brothers."

"Grier has noticed a lot of changes since returning to his alma mater. "They moved my football field,"

Grier said. "Everything is so much bigger and there are so many people. It looks a lot different, but its good to be back."

In the last year and a half, Grier has been traveling college campuses around the country spreading the word of God.

"I was 'born again' four and a half years ago," Grier said. "After I retired from football and making all those movies, I still felt an emptiness. To fulfill that emptiness, I turned to God."

Grier retired from the NFL wars in the late 1960's, after stints with the New York Giants and the Los Angeles Rams, where he was part of one of the greatest defensive lines in NFL history. Along with Grier, Merlin Olson, Deacon Jones, and Lamar Lundy comprised the infamous Fearsome Foursome.

"Nobody can ever remember Lamar Lundy," Grier said, "but he always got the job done."

Grier was heartbroken at being traded from the Giants to the Rams. "We were one big family in New York, I loved the Giants," Grier said. "When I was traded to Los Angeles, it was totally different. There were three different groups. The whites were in one corner, the blacks in another and there were the coaches."

Things got better in Los Angeles with the emergence of the Fearsome Foursome and four years later the Rams played the Giants.

"We destroyed them 59-7," Grier said. "They accused us of pouring it on and you know what, we did. We tore them up."

Grier seemed disturbed over the present condition of the NFL, especially Greg Gross, cutting the margin to 7-4 in the seventh.

"I think the strike is silly," Grier said. "We don't need strikes. We need to recognize what we're facing. The players are making a good salary. I don't expect this result because I still haven't picked my starting 11."

# Expos hand Phillies 1-4 loss

MONTREAL (AP) — Chris Speier drove in a team-record eight runs with bases loaded triple, a three-run homer and a single to back the five-hit pitching of Bill Gullickson as the Montreal Expos defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 11-4 last night.

The eight RBI broke the Expos' record of seven, shared by four players, most recently Larry Parrish in 1980.

Speier set the record with his seventh homer of the season, giving Montreal a 10-4 lead in the seventh. The Expos had cruised for their 11th win in the second against Philadelphia starter Dick Ruthven, 11-1.

Gary Carter and Tim Lincecum grounded the inning with singles and Warren Cromartie walked to load the bases with none out. Speier then grounded a triple that rolled all the way to the center field wall as all three runners scored.

Montreal boosted its margin to 5-0 in the third after singles by Al Oliver and Carter and Cromartie's walk loaded the bases. Speier then hit Ruthven's first pitch into center field for a two-run single.

Gary Matthews delivered an RBI triple off Gullickson, 12-1, in the fourth but Andre Dawson's sacrifice fly restored the five-run margin in the bottom of the inning.

Carter's 29th homer of the season made it 7-1 in the fifth before Ivan DeJesus tripled home two runs and scored on an infield out by pinch-hitter Greg Gross, cutting the margin to 7-4 in the seventh.

The loss dampened the National League East pennant hopes of the Phillies, who started the day 11-10 in games behind the St. Louis Cardinals.

Cardinals 2, Pirates 1. ST. LOUIS (AP) — Tommy Herr singled home Tito Landrum from second base with one out in the eighth inning to give the St. Louis Cardinals a 2-1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates last night.

The victory, the Cardinals' ninth in 10 games, boosted St. Louis' lead to 5 1/2 games in the National League East and set its magic number to six. Any combination of six St. Louis victories and losses by second-place Philadelphia gives the Cardinals

the division title. Held to four hits through seven innings, St. Louis started its winning rally with one out in the eighth on Steve Braun's pinch-hit double. Landrum pinch-ran for Braun and raced home with the game-winning homer when Herr laced his hit to left field off Pirates starter Rick Rhoden, 11-1.

Dave LaPlante, P.3, scattered eight hits in eight innings, and Bruce Sutter pitched the ninth to gain his 35th save.

Bill Madlock followed Lee Lacy's triple down the right field line with a groundout, giving a Pittsburgh 1-0 lead in the first inning.

Giants 2, Reds 0. CINCINNATI (AP) — Renee Martin fired a two-hitter for seven innings and Milt May and Johnnie LeMaster provided run-scoring singles to give the San Francisco Giants a 2-0 victory over the Cincinnati Reds last night.

Martin, 7-8, permitted a single by Dan Driessen in the second and a single by Alex Trevino leading off the eighth before being relieved by Al Holland, who went on to register his fourth save and complete the two-hitter.

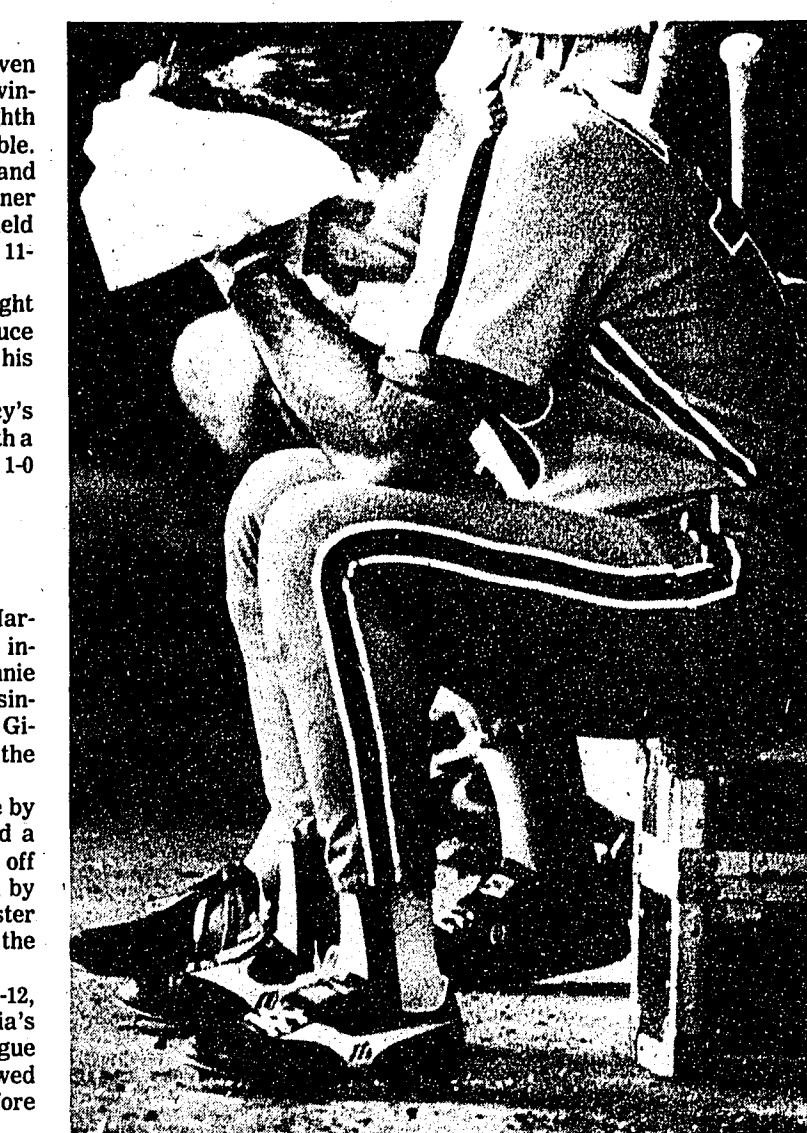
