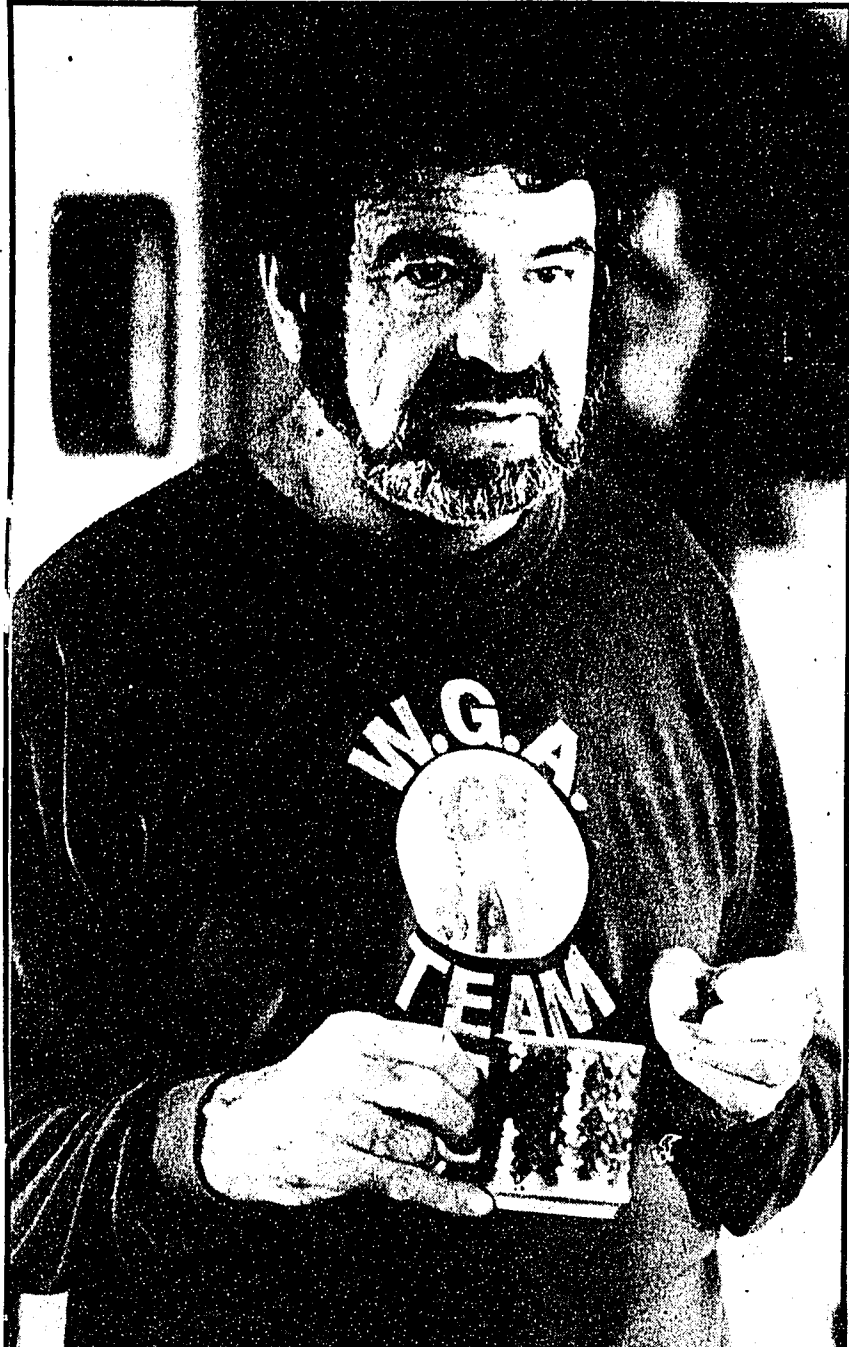

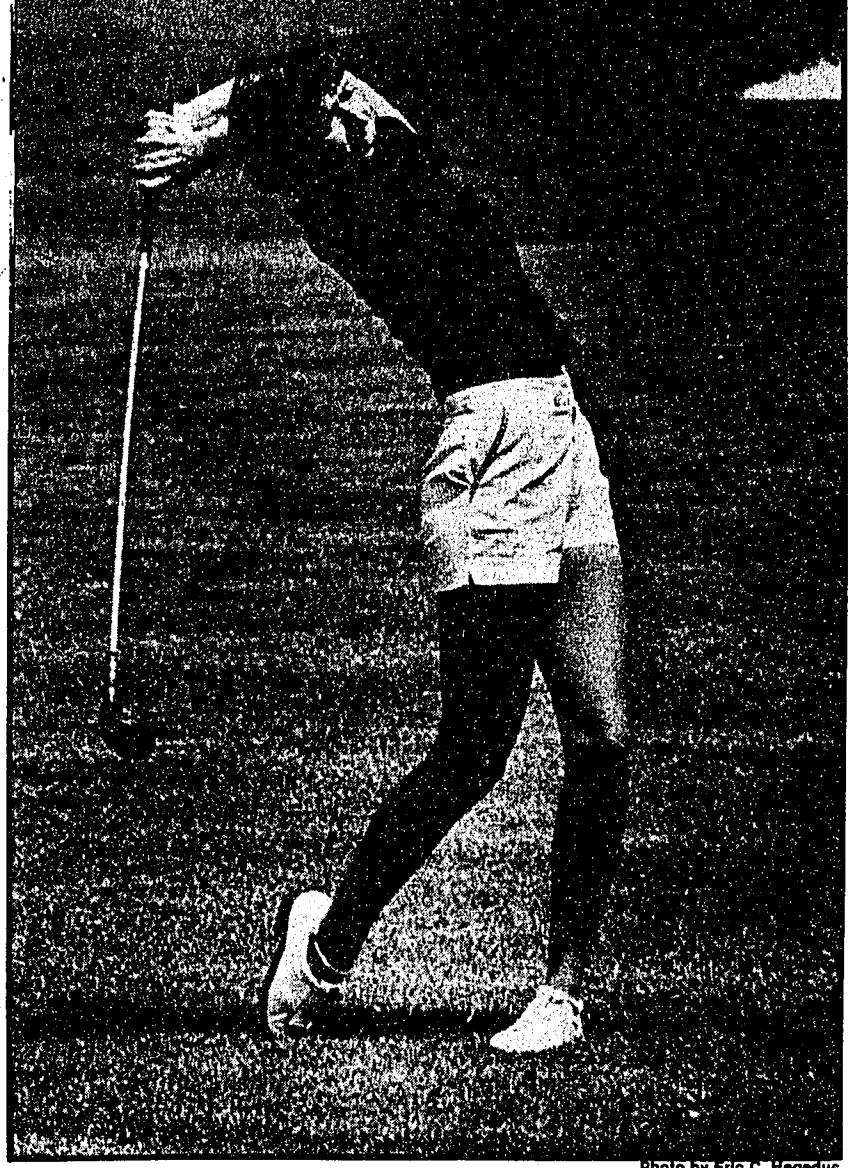
Museum of Art "The England of William Penn, 1644-1718"

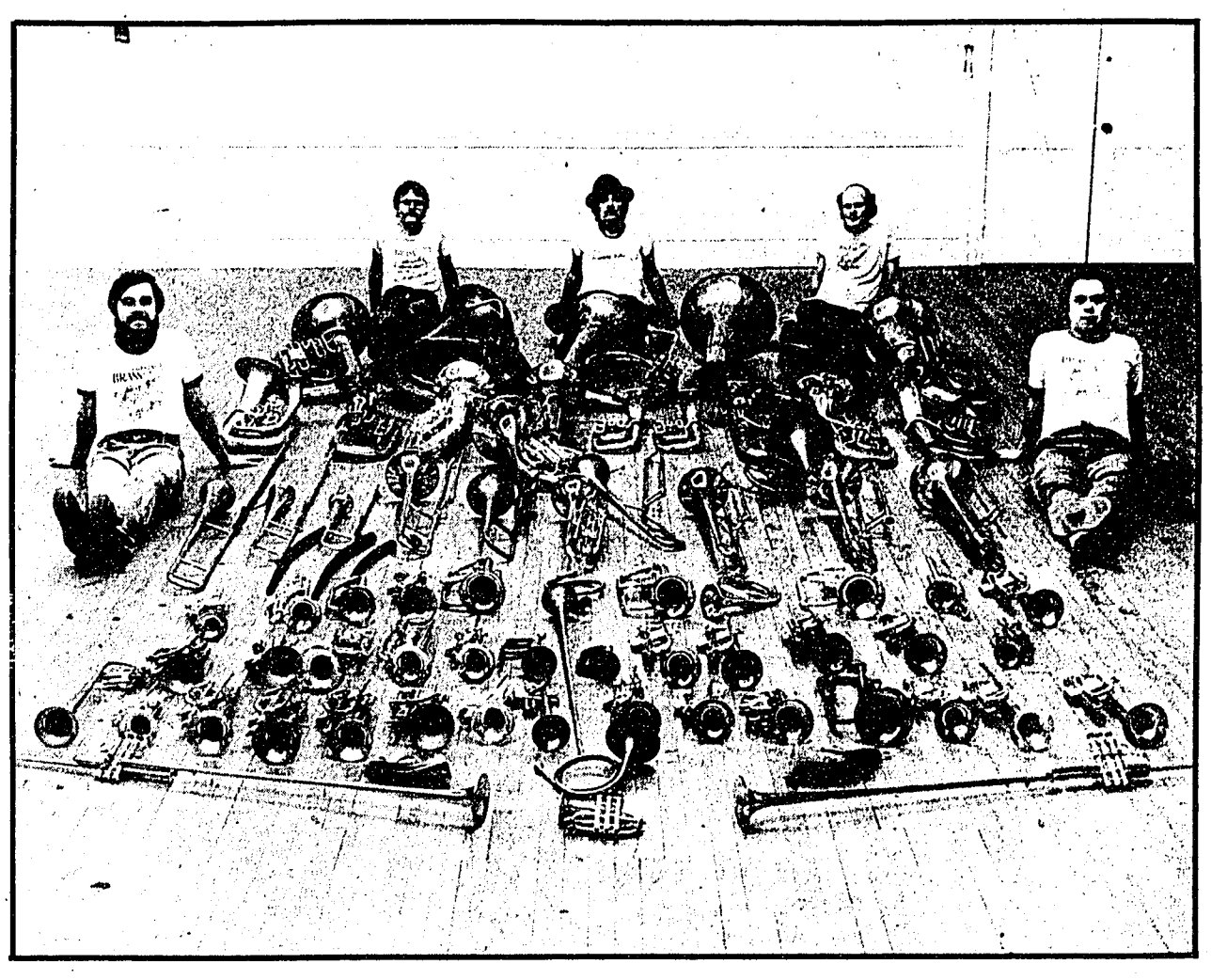
Near the Reserve Reading Room, Celeste Fernandez Fantarte displays her large color photos of her home land, Puerto Rico.

Earth and Mineral Sciences Museum and Art Gallery "Form and Color in Minerals" is a continuing exhibit of the most visually impressive specimens from the museum's collection. Also on display are paintings and drawings related to the mineral industry.

Columbus Chapel and Boal Mansion Museum This history museum in Boalsburg houses a hidden and most incredible collection of American artifacts including one of the largest weapons collections in the country. Also the Boals inherited the entire chapel contents from their Columbus relatives who kept Christopher Columbus' sea chest and an alleged piece of the True Cross.

- The show is **NOT SOLD OUT.**
- No **CAMERAS** are permitted in the hall.
- Ticket holders should **CLAIM** their seats at least 10 minutes **PRIOR** to the show (which begins at 8:00 p.m.).
- All Seats are **RESERVED.** Concertgoers should remain seated throughout the performance so that **ALL** may enjoy observing the show without obstruction. Discrepancies with seats can be resolved by the nearest UCC usher.
- No **ALCOHOL** is permitted in the hall and **SMOKING** is only allowed in designated lounge areas.
- Frisbees and other airborne objects are extremely **DANGEROUS** in a large crowd and also jeopardize the artists willingness to continue the show.
- Open **FLAMES** are a fire **HAZARD** and require that the house lights be turned on thus prematurely ending the show. The artists cannot hear lighters and matches but certainly respond to hall shattering applause.

The SAFETY of the concert audience is of paramount importance to the UCC. Thus, keeping these few points in mind an exceptionally fine show can be experienced by all Sunday night.
