

A sultry State College showing for Playboy's Miss October

Friday's rush to Happy Hours was pleasantly interrupted by Playboy's October Playmate, an attractive blonde who drew crowds at several downtown businesses.

Surrounded by gawking fans, Marianne Gravatte graciously signed hundreds of autographs. Her stops included Graham's, McLanahan's, Kaye's Korner and Uni-Mart. Gravatte delivered each autograph with a big, sometimes shy, smile and rewarded each fan with individual attention for waiting in line. A model for only one year and once very introverted, the 22-year-old sometimes still finds her role in the public eye intimidating.

"When we first started the tour, I was really scared," she said, "but now that it's almost over, I'm just starting to enjoy it." The three-week promotional tour included stops at Sacramento, Stockton and Mather Air Force Base in California; Boston, Allouana and State College. Graver said she liked State College best because most of the people were her own age.

"I'd always been really shy, but I'm getting over it," she said. "I really don't have much choice now." The sultry model was clad in a silky, form-fitting, violet jumpsuit with a modest scoop neckline and a tiny bunny insignia sewn on the upper left corner. Strappy, high-heeled sandals supplemented her natural height of 5 feet 8 inches.

Specifics, for those who haven't bought October's Playboy yet, include long blonde locks, soft blue eyes and a 21-inch waist. No less astounding is her weight of 105 pounds.

Born in Hollywood, Gravatte says she has been interested in modeling for a long time. "I worked for three years in a grocery store as a bagger in Arcadia (a town 30 miles east of Hollywood). Then I realized at 21, if I was ever going to do any modeling, I'd better do it now."

She applied at the Playboy Modeling Agency and soon appeared in ads for jeans, wet suits, beer, pools and motorcycles. Then the magazine division offered her a centerfold contract.

"I thought about it for a month, but I was on a time limit if I wanted to be considered for one of this year's issues," Gravatte said. "I finally said 'yes' because I thought it would give my career a real boost. "I'm glad I decided to do it, but right before (the October issue) came out, I thought 'Did I do the right thing?'"

Certainly her bank statement told

her she had done the right thing. Gravatte received \$10,000 for modeling the centerfold portfolio, which took three weeks to complete.

Although Gravatte had no authority over which shots were published, she did limit photographers to "only classy shots."

Gravatte enjoys modeling mostly because she meets new people. Still, time to herself is very important. Her favorite way to relax is not unlike many students: "just lying around watching TV."

Gravatte also loves driving around in her car, a Cadillac Seville, alone at night while listening to her stereo. While she prefers New Wave, she does not like "the real radical kind." One of her favorite groups is The Cars.

For exercise, she enjoys water skiing and boating on the Colorado River as well as snow skiing, bicycling and racquetball. Most of all, she enjoys walking, preferably along a Hawaiian beach.

Gravatte also has a deep love of animals: Her pets include five cats and two birds.

A one-time owner of a dog that lived to be 17 years old, Gravatte said, "When it died, I stayed in my room for three whole days. It was like losing one of the family. I swore I wouldn't get another one, but of course I will."

Gravatte's future plans include a few more active years of modeling and then marrying and raising a family.

Few volunteer for escort service

Only 24 people have signed up to be student escorts, the security chairwoman for the Association of Residence Hall Students said.

Maryrose Crist said that in past years, about 170 people have signed up to help with the Student Assistance Center's service. "We can't start the escort system until we get more volunteers," she said. "I think it's really important that we get escorts this year, especially in light of the two attempted assaults."

The next screening will be held from 7 to 9 tonight in 135 Boucke, Crist said, and students can just walk in if they don't have time to sign up.

Betsy Moore, general counselor for the Student Assistance Center, said, "If we can get enough people to come in (today), we can get started Tuesday, that's what our goal is."

Potential escorts cannot make tonight's screening, they can drop in any time and give the receptionist their name, Crist said.

Potential escorts will be interviewed for about five minutes by one of the student counselors at the center or a member ARHS, the Undergraduate Student Government or the Interfraternity Council, Crist said.

"This is to screen out people who are using the service to meet women, etc.," Crist said.

Moore said, "We need them to know that any untoward behavior would get them into the discipline system."

Escorts only get two or three calls every year if the service gets enough volunteers, Crist said.

Although escorts are available any time, it may be difficult to find someone at 3 a.m. in the middle of winter, Moore said.

To reserve an escort, a student must call the Student Assistance Center between 5 p.m. and midnight, Monday through Friday, or between noon and 8 p.m., Saturday and Sunday, and make the arrangements, Crist said.

The service obtains a name, description and location of the person and calls an escort with the message, Crist said, then calls back with the name and description of the escort.

"We don't encourage people calling every single night," she said. "We like people to take the bus sometimes, meet with friends sometimes, etc."

Moore said, "We don't want to foster dependency, but we want to use this as one of the options for women who want to use this for their own safety."

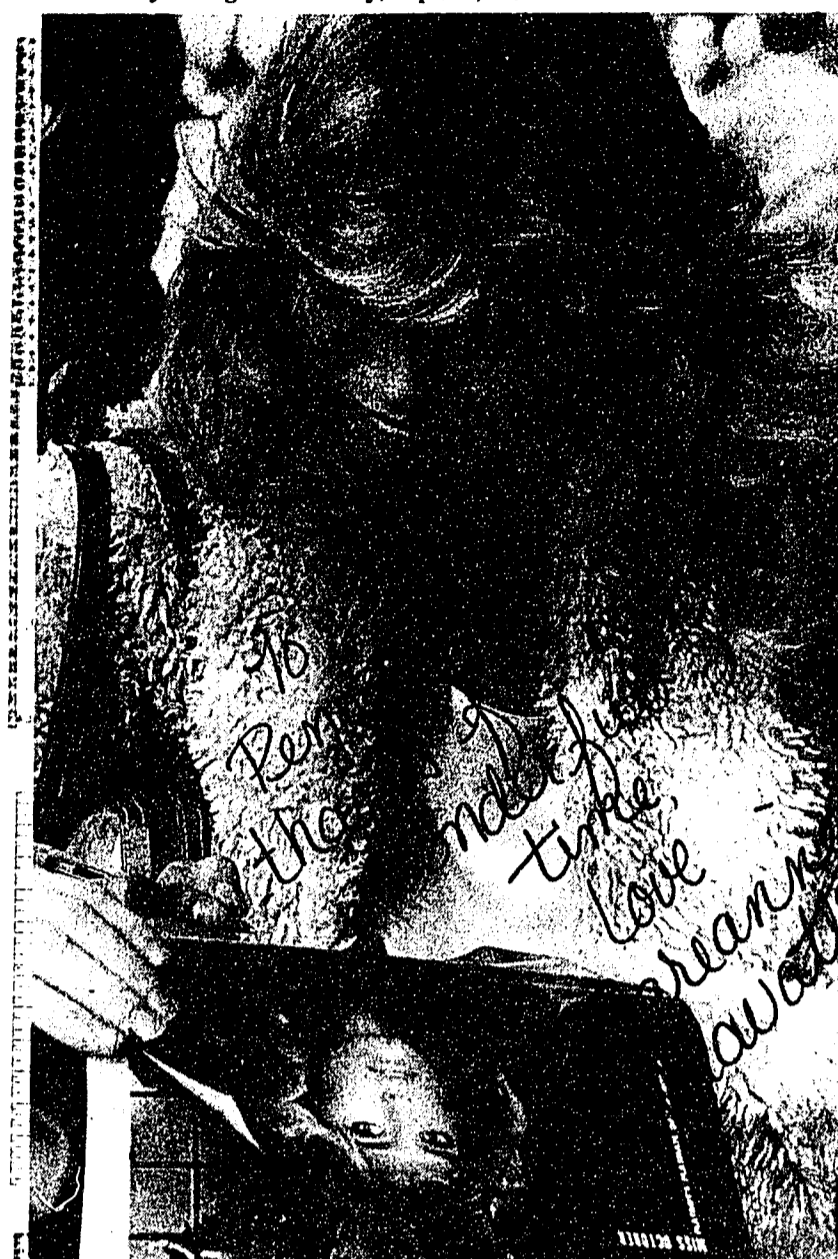
