#### NFL strike talks resumes By DAVE GOLDBERG

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y. - While the nation's pro football fans found alternative ways of spending their game-less Sunday, Ed Garvey, Jack Donlan and their associates resumed negotiations in the player union's first regular-season strike in the 63-year history of the

But even before the talks began for the first time since they broke off Sept. 17, there were signs that more than just this third regular-season weekend (14 games) would be affected.

Gene Upshaw, president of the union, said on one TV program both sides were "very, very far apart" and Tom Condon (Kansas City), Dan Jiggetts (Chicago), that the strike could be prolonged because of the league's contract with the three television networks. They will pay the NFL about \$30 million for this weekend's games and another \$30 million for next weekend's, the money to be refunded next year only if the game are eventually canceled.

However, some four hours after the talks began, Jim Miller, an NFL Management Council spokesman, said that no progress had been made at the meeting and that both sides reiterated their previous positions. And on another program, NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle said the strike would have to be settled by Thursday in order to rescue next Sunday's and Monday

night's games. Donlan, the executive director of the Management Council, the owners' negotiating team, and Garvey, his

counterpart with the union, met at about 2:15 p.m. EDT at the faculty board room of Hofstra University in this New York City suburb. The building is adjacent to Weeb Ewbank Hall, the training facilities of the New

Upshaw, also a guard for the Los Angles Raiders, and Garvey arrived from New York, tailed by a caravan of media people, after Upshaw had appeared on "Face The Nation," a CBS public-affairs program. Donlan was to have appeared but he withdrew, citing the negotiations. Also at the bargaining session were Chip Yablonski

and Dick Berthelsen, counsel for the union, and executive board members Mark Murphy (Washington), James Lofton (Green Bay), Jeff Van Note (Atlanta) John Bunting (Philadelphia) and Stan White (Detroit). Jimmy Cefalo (Miami) was delayed when his flight from Florida was fogged in. Guards kept everyone but the negotiators out of the

building — and for a moment, they kept Garvey out, too. He had to show a credit card to prove his identity before the guards would let him pass. At about 6 p.m., Jiggetts left the building for a moment and when asked how the talks were going said,




