

Council discusses student trustee selection

Student leaders discussed the selection process for the possible successor to the student member of the University Board of Trustees at last night's meeting of the Undergraduate Student Government Executive Council.

Student Trustee Paul Bell said he will write to Gov. Dick Thornburgh in January asking him to choose a student when Bell's three-year term ends next year.

In the past, the governor has selected the trustee from among candidates chosen by a student committee. Because they participate in trust-

ees meetings, USG President Leni Barch, Graduate Student Association President Kumar Chittipeddi and the Council of Branch Campus Student Governments representative Alan Price should be on the selection committee, Bell said.

Also, the selection committee should give special consideration to honor societies, Steve Ripp, USG Senate President said.

But, "Using (honor societies) is an abhorration of what you're trying to accomplish," said Interfraternity Council President Luke Taiclet.

Those students do not represent the majority of University students, he said.

Other possible members suggested

include students from the House of Academic Representatives and Black Caucus, and, a returning adult student, a student-at-large and an international student.

Ripp suggested that a USG senator should sit on the committee because he is elected to represent students. Bell said that a senator could be the student-at-large because he doesn't deal directly with trustee matters as the executives do.

Bell said the selection must be based on specific criteria.

For example, the new trustee must have an "all-University perspective," realizing the large size and the numerous research facilities operating at the University, he said.

Committee rejects MX funding

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dealing a setback to President Reagan, a House-Senate conference committee refused last night to approve money for production of the MX missile.

The decision eliminates from a stopgap spending bill the \$988 million Reagan requested to produce the first five of the 100 nuclear-tipped weapons he wants to build.

But it retained \$2.5 billion in research and development money for the missile, although most of that money can't be spent until Congress approves a basing mode.

The compromise "is not what the administration wants, but it's as good as they could have gotten in view" of a resounding defeat for MX production in the

House two weeks ago, said Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, a major defender of the administration on the committee.

"I hope the administration will understand what we've had to do," said Rep. Jack Edwards, R-Ala., a key MX supporter in the House.

The compromise was approved by voice vote as the conferees worked out differences between the House and Senate versions of a stopgap funding bill.

The compromise provides that sometime after next March 1, Reagan has to tell Congress about his plans to base the missile. Both houses of Congress would then have to approve the basing mode within 45 days or it could not go ahead.


