Cries of 'We're not going to take it anymore' heard on spectator picket lines

I had been tailgating one hot sausage sandwich too long. It was 12:55 p.m. and I was only nearing the ramp of Gate C at beautiful Three Rivers Stadium. I looked doubtful that I'd make it to my seat by kickoff time. I was running into the stadium when I was accosted by two men wearing long executive-type coats and hand-painted silk ties.

"Where are you going, scab?" one of the men asked me. "This is the 'burgh. We don't take kindly to anyone who'll cross a picket line."

"Who's on strike now?" I asked. "The ground crew? The scoreboard repairmen? The ushers again?"

"No, we are. Fans Local 109."

"When'd ja go out?"

"Weeks ago. But typically, the media was concentrating on the players and didn't devote any attention to us."

I broke into a smile and decided to go along with this joke. "So, how many fans are out on strike?"

"There's thousands of us," he answered while adjusting his tie. "Just some of 'em here." He pointed to a large gathering of people carrying,

"NFLPA Unfair to Fans!!!" signs. I knew none of these individuals could be Steelers fans. Not one of them wore a black and gold tassel cap. Plus, I smelled something funny, an aroma of Old Spice and minty Scope instead of kielbassa and Iron City.

"C'mon, stop kidding around. I want to go see the Black and Gold eat up the Browns." I started into the stadium when I was deterred by a man with a protest sign.

A man just as nattily dressed as the rest, pushed his glasses up his nose and approached me.

"They happen to be very serious, sir. My name is Fred Marvey and I'm representing the Pittsburgh fans in the upcoming talks between players, fans and management."

"What talks?"

"Well, there's about 1,000 of us on strike right now. At home games we picket; away games, we watch movies on Channel 4. Our movement is slowly picking up momentum. We figure one million or so of us will be refusing to watch the games by next week."

"But the playoffs are next week. You have to support the team."

"Why, they don't seem to care about us?"

"Yeah," echoed the other union members.

Said Marvey, "We're going to get the negotiating table. Then we're going to ask for 55 percent of the television gross, a domed stadium and a cheerleading squad before we go back to our seats."

A man came out of the crowd. "Wait a minute, I think we should emphasize that we aren't really concerned with material things. What the fan of Pittsburgh wants is some respect. We're sick of being portrayed as loud-mouthed, crazy beer drinkers to the rest of the country. Do any of here have on a stupid gorilla suit on? Do we have our shirts off, proving how many we can be with the weather 20 below? I'm no slob and neither are my buddies here. I mean, I'm an executive. I drink Dewars. I'm intelligent. I want the media to show this."

"A woman comes up to me, doing some finger pointing."

"And it's not only the media but the players that insult us. I mean it's obvious they don't care about the fans. They never prepare for press conferences or interviews. It's really insulting to read the sports section or watch postgame interviews anymore. All you hear are cliches like, 'We gave it 100 percent; it wasn't in the cards or he's a real competitor.' These guys are supposed to be professionals. Can't they come up with some variety in their locker room rhetoric?"

"You know what's even worse?" another fan chimes in. "The way players sign autographs these days. They scribble instead of signing. I think it should be one of our demands at the talks. We want neater autographs when we hand our Froi magazines to a player."

The finger pointer had more to say. "I think cuisine should be part of



the package we ask for. If we want to upgrade the image of the Pittsburgh fans, the quickest way would be to rid the stadium of food like hot dogs and kraut and replace it with maybe shrimp scampi, creamy soups and some nice veal dishes. I'm sure the LeMort would cater each Sunday."

"And Mr Marvey," said a fourth fan, "what about my proposal that players should have to publicly apologize to fans for dropped passes, fumbles and missed blocking assignments?"

"Don't worry," he said while pushing his glasses up once more. "I'll get you guys everything you're asking for. We'll hold out until we get everything, even the motion to include taxi fares and a free glass of I.C. with each game ticket. They can't go on without us. After all, we're the

As they began arguing over demands, I slipped away. I have to admit I was quite disappointed with their attitude. After all, strikes are for pro athletes and school teachers, not for common people.

NFL struck with slow ticket sales

Tickets for Green Bay Packers home games have in the past been the object of custody fights in divorce actions and in the probating of wills. But the once-coveted pastebords are readily available for this weekend's game, illustrating a trend in this strike-shortened NFL season.

There will be no standing-room-only signs, but ticket sales for the first-round game of the expanded 16-team National Football League playoffs Saturday and Sunday reflect the fan erosion that has been apparent since the end of the 57-day NFL players' strike.

In Green Bay yesterday there were more than 18,000 tickets still available for Saturday's game with the St. Louis Cardinals at the 56,189-seat Lambeau field.

Although there was "a steady stream" of customers at the Packers ticket office, team ticket

manager Mark Wagner said, "We're going to have to stay steady the rest of the week and sell a lot of seats Saturday" in order to have a sellout. "Normally, unless the visiting team sends back some of their allotment."

If the Packers don't sell out the stadium, it will be the first time since 1959, the late Vince Lombardi's first year as coach.

At Irving, Texas, the Dallas Cowboys had sold out 44 straight games until the first weekend after the strike. The chances of a sellout for Sunday's game with Tampa Bay appeared slim yesterday, with about 24,000 tickets remaining.

Cincinnati, which opens the playoffs at home against the New York Jets Sunday, completed a sellout of 59,274-seat Riverfront Stadium about noon yesterday, while it appeared the Pittsburgh Steelers, who play San Diego Sunday, and Miami, which takes on New England Saturday, will sell out by game time.

The Steelers, whose fan support has remained strong all year, have 52,000 season ticket holders and 54,000 seats in Three Rivers Stadium. At Miami, the Dolphins still had about 20,000 season tickets left yesterday, but a ticket office spokesman they were extremely busy.

A survey by The Associated Press of no-shows and unsold tickets in the seven weeks of post-strike football showed that NFL stadiums were, on the average, just over 76 percent full for the 88 games played.

The NFL counted no-shows — people who bought tickets but didn't use them — at 11.6 percent this year, compared to 6.7 in 1981. No-shows for the post-strike period were 12.5 percent, according to AP's figures.

The NFL put average per-game attendance for the full season at 53,000, with no-shows not included. Last season, average paid attendance was 60,745, an all-time record, with no-shows included in the tally.
