Duran goes for WBA championship against Moore

NEW YORK (AP) - Roberto Duran could step back on the glory road or begin life looking back at his mostly illustrious past when he challenges Davey Moore for the World Boxing Association junior middleweight championship tonight at Madison

Square Garden. "He has experience, 70 fights (actually, 79) two world championships," the 24-year-old Moore, a champion with just 12 pro fights, said Tuesday at a news conference.
