For some people it would be, according to a survey by U.S. Catholic magazine. The magazine said 283 people — a 28 percent return rate responded to a questionnaire on the afterlife with multiple choice and essay questions.

Among the findings: Ninety-seven percent of the respondents expressed a belief in heaven and 83 percent said they expected to go

• Respondents were reluctant to place any human in hell. Only 22 percent said they thought Adolf Hitler was probably in hell; 15 percent condemned Josef Stalin; 10 percent, Judas; and 6 percent, Pontius Pilate. Twelve percent picked Idi Amin, 5 percent said current Soviet leaders and Playboy magazine founder Hugh Hefner and 2 percent said former President Richard Nixon. • While 86 percent said they believed in hell, 60 percent

said they had not decided "to do good and avoid evil because I fear the consequences after I die." Six percent of the respondents said they did not believe in hell. "The decline in the belief in hell is one of the most

important changes in our history," the Rev. Martin Marty, a church historian and University of Chicago professor, commented in the magazine. "This is a growth in humaneness and a great sense among people that fear of hell doesn't motivate people to be good." "Catholics are confident and optimistic about the af-

terlife. They believe in a merciful, loving and forgiving God," writes author James Breig in an article about the survey in the May issue of the magazine. "For the most part, they are unafraid of dying ... and they have lessened their thinking on the darker elements of limbo,

WASHINGTON (AP) - The first night launching of the space shuttle will be delayed beyond Aug. 20 because it is taking longer than expected to check out a communications satellite to be tested during the flight, NASA officials said yesterday.

The new target for liftoff of shuttle flight No. 8 will be between Aug. 23 and 30, said David Garrett, spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Adminis-

A knowledgeable source who asked not to be identified said the new launch date probably will be closer to the 30th than the 23rd. Garrett said officials hope to set a firm date early next week after additional calibration checks have been made with the Tracking and Data Relay Satellite.

The agency said last week expected delays in both the eighth and ninth missions because of problems with TDRS, which is now in a proper orbit after being njected into the wrong path by a errant rocket last April. The ninth flight, carrying the European Spacelab, a science facility, probably will slip from Sept 30 to late October, officials said. TDRS is not necessary to the eighth flight, which will carry an Insat communications satellite for India, but NASA wants to check out the communications system through the shuttle before the ninth mission, when it will be essential for relaying high-speed data from the Spacelab.


