The roommate of a University student who died from heart failure Feb. 3 was found dead in her apartment last Thursday morning, an apparent suicide victim, the county coroner said Friday.

Gail Ann Blumberg (junior-special education), 23, of 458 E. College Ave, Apt. 206, was found after State College police entered the apartment

Blumberg was pronounced dead at 10:25 a.m. Thursday by Centre County Coroner Robert Neff.

Neff said the preliminary cause of death was suicide due to prescription drug overdose.

Noise problem may be solved at demonstration

Although the upcoming noise demonstration may resolve the decibel problem, the demonstration is not without flaws, Interfraternity Council-President Adam Levinson said during the organization's meeting last night at Kappa Sigma fraternity, 255 Highland Drive.

During the demonstration, schedule 1 for 3 p.m. Feb. 23 at Alpha Sigma Phi fraternity, 328 E. Fairmount Ave., Levinson said a stereo speaker will be placed in a window, and a group of students and residents will decide on a reasonable decibel level.
