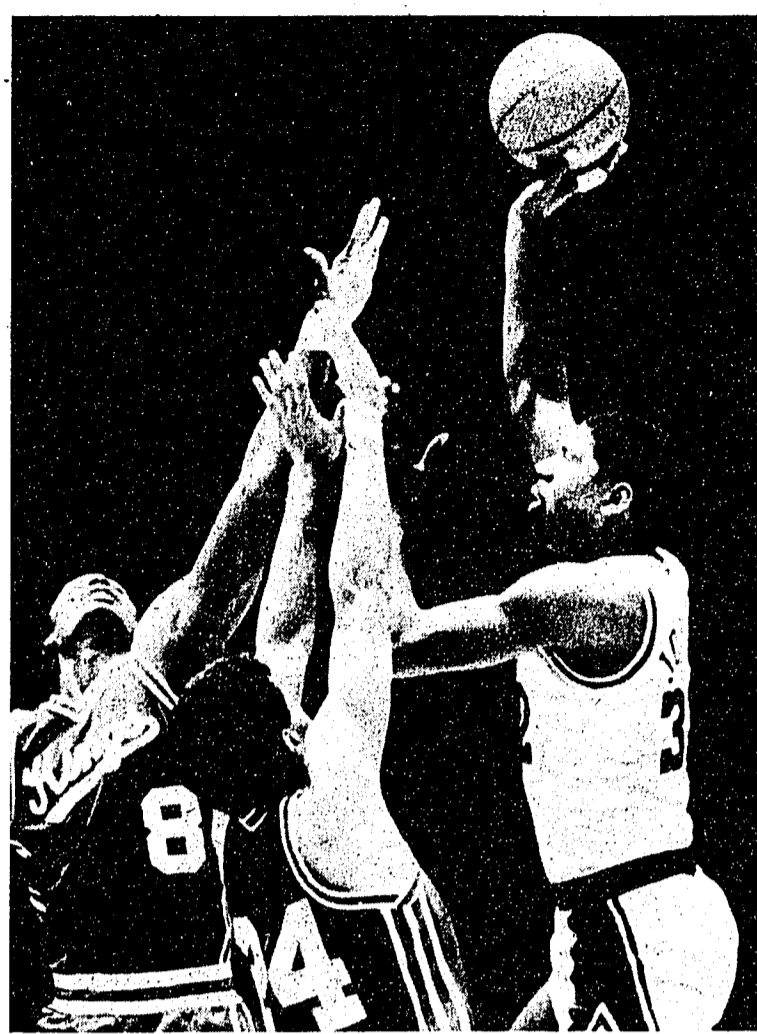

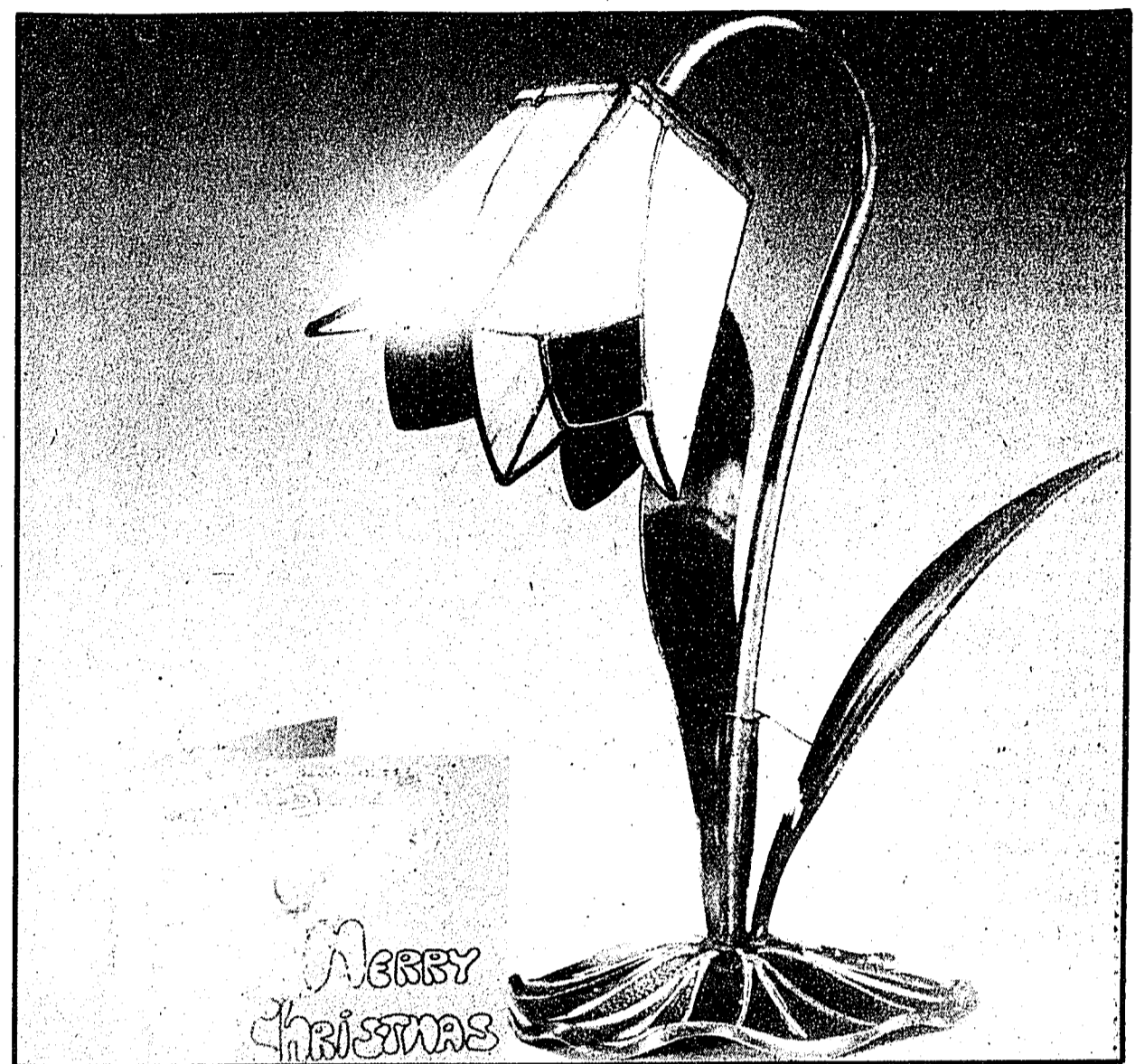

"Le Boum" Claude Pinoteur directed this award-winning romantic comedy from France, whose overwhelming popularity in its own country inspired a sequel. The film makes its campus debut this weekend, 7 and 9 p.m. tomorrow and Monday, 112 Kern.

"Coming Home" Hal Ashby's thesis on Vietnam anguish and suburban paralysis is chock-full of atmosphere and humid with emotional turbulence, but it can't quite compensate for the title attitude and transitional lapses that pervade the story. Oscar winners Jon Voight and Jane Fonda are very good here, but their characters as written are so grim and wordless they become tiring. But Bruce Dern is scary perfection as Fonda's edgy, gung-ho Marine husband, 7 and 9-15 tonight, 10 p.m. tomorrow, 112 Chambers. Admission is free.

"Psycho" Hitchcock's most commercially successful film has been accused of being everything from cinematic mastery to unguarded woman-hatred, but it still gives you chills and thrills after all these years. One of the blackest comedies ever, it made Anthony Perkins a star and made the viewer just that much more apprehensive about taking a shower. A classic, 7 and 9 p.m. tomorrow and Sunday, HUB Assembly Room.

"An American in Paris" Eight Academy Awards, including Best Picture 1951, went to Vincente Minnelli's sumptuous mix of classical dance, modern art, the music of Gershwin and the earthbound brilliance of choreographer-star (and University alumnus) Gene Kelly. It's also a magical entertainment. Presented by Cinematheque as part of the "Golden Age of the Musical" series, 7 and 9 tonight, HUB Assembly Room.

"A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum" Alan Arkin is superb in this erratic, but pleasantly flaky 1979 comedy about a wedding engagement in Connecticut that snowballs into a South American coup. Richard Libertine is splendidly nutty as a deranged banana republic Premier, 7, 9 and 11 tonight and tomorrow; 7 and 9 p.m. Sunday, 108 Forum.

"Deliverance" Some good old boys go where they've never gone before in John Boorman's prophetic, scary parable, based on the novel by James Dickey. Strong stuff, even 12 years later. Burt Reynolds, Jon Voight, Ned Beatty, Ronny Cox, 7, 9 and 11 tonight and tomorrow; 7 and 9 p.m. Sunday, 105 Forum.

"Monty Python and the Holy Grail" A splendidly messy, messy sendup of King Arthur that's become a B-movie classic. The Pythons are at their yeoman-like, merciless best in this 1975 yuk-fest. "Jesus Christ Superstar" Ted Neeley, who's too often confused for one of the Doobie Brothers, is a screaming travesty in director Norman Jewison's well intentioned but feverishly somber meditation on the suffering of Christ. A couple of screenings of this movie at close range can cause

"Romancing the Stone" Robert Zemeckis' sendup of the action-adventure genre is so oblique and slick for its first hour (at least) that it leaves you chilled. 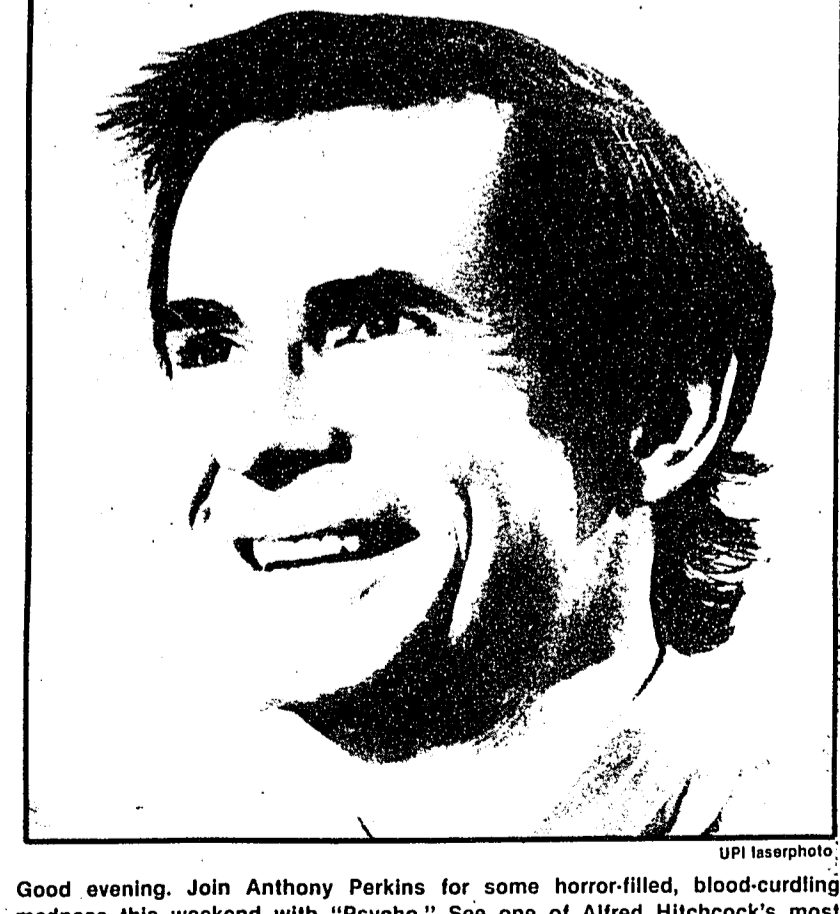
