

Diressen traded to Expos

MONTREAL (AP) — Pete Rose never said he'd be the Montreal Expos' first base coach, but as he relinquishes his starting first base job to former Cincinnati Reds teammate Dan Driessen, he hopes no one views his replacement as acquired yesterday, that way either.

Rose, signed as a free agent in the off-season to provide leadership and some offensive spark, is now a pinch hitter and sometime starter.

Montreal General Manager John McFall confirmed yesterday the Expos had acquired Driessen from Cincinnati for pitchers Andy McGaffigan and Jim Jefferson, a minor league player who had been with the Expos' Class AA Jacksonville affiliate.

Driessen, who was playing out his option with the Reds, agreed to a three-year contract with a one-year option with Montreal. Terms were not disclosed.

"Driessen will be the first baseman," said Expos Manager Bill Virdon. "He'll start the majority of the time, although against certain left-handers I'll start Gary Carter to give him a break from catching."

"Pete will pinch hit," Virdon said.

of Rose, who is chasing Ty Cobb for the major league's all-time hit record.

Virdon said Terry Francona, another Expos' first baseman who is currently recovering from a knee injury, will play left field when he is fit to play again, likely in mid-August.

Rose passes the baton to Driessen amicably. "I'm not willing."

"All I can say is if Danny's the one who's going to turn this thing around, then I'm glad we got him," Rose said.

Driessen, 32, who has a 270 lifetime batting average with 126 home runs and 159 stolen bases, was hitting .280 with seven homers and 28 runs batted in 81 games with Cincinnati this season. He's expected to join the Expos today in Philadelphia for Montreal's weekend series with the Phillies.

The Expos are currently 12 games behind the front-running New York Mets in the NL East Division.

McGaffigan, who came to the Expos earlier this season from the San Francisco Giants as compensation after pitcher Fred Breining — acquired along with Max Venable for Al Oliver — arrived with an injured arm, was content with the deal.

Padres rout Reds, 8-2

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Tony Gwynn, the National League's leading hitter, hit 3-for-4 to raise his average to .362 and sparked a 12-hit attack that carried the San Diego Padres past the Cincinnati Reds 8-2 yesterday.

Steve Garvey opened the Padres' scoring with a two-run single in his third at-bat, left the game for a pinch runner after doubling in the third run sixth inning. Mark Thurmond, 8-5, won his third consecutive start as he went seven innings and gave up two runs on seven hits. Greg Harris worked the final two innings.

Steve Garvey opened the Padres' scoring with a two-run single in the first off right-hander Jeff Russell, 4-12, who lasted only two innings. Kevin McReynolds added to make it 2-0 and Gwynn made it 4-0 in the third when he singled in Alan Wiggins from second.

The Reds made it 4-2 in the sixth. Pinch hitter Dave Concepcion, appearing in his 200th major league game, singled and went to third on Gary Redus' double. Groundouts by Ron Oester and Cesar Cedeno scored both runners.

But the Padres tagged reliever Keefe Cato for three runs in the sixth.

Coaches concerned about TV package

CHICAGO — Fearing overexposure and a possible drop in gate receipts, Big Ten football coaches yesterday expressed reservations about the television package worked out between CBS and the Big Ten and Pac-10 conferences.

"No question in my mind there can be too many games on television," said Mike White of defending Big Ten champion Illinois. "I saw it happen in basketball and it can happen in football."

Michigan's everpopular Wolverines are slated for a possible five appearances and Bo Schmeer, dean of Big Ten coaches, is worried.

"I still want to see 105,000 people in our stadium when we play at home," Schmeer said. "What did we get from television last year, \$700,000? We get over a million dollars in one game from gate receipts."

The Big Ten and the Pac-10 television football package, which begins Sept. 15 with Washington at Michigan and runs through Dec. 1 with the Army-Navy game.

The Big Ten and the Pac-10 joined forces against the College Football Association, which is made up of other major conferences and

independent football powers. CBS turned down a deal with the CFA, which already has a contract with ABC-TV.

All of the CBS games will be on national television, including three double-headers, Michigan, Ohio State, Iowa and Illinois dominate the Big Ten schedule while Indiana, Minnesota, Northwestern and Michigan State have been shut out. Washington, UCLA and Southern California are predominant on the Pac-10 side of the ledger.

"We think it's a helluva schedule," said Neal Pilson, CBS vice president in charge of sports. "It's not written in granite, there could be some possible changes."

There could. On Sept. 22 the schedule has Nebraska at UCLA or Iowa at Ohio State. Nebraska is a member of the CFA and could refuse to cooperate. That's why the schedule also has "or Iowa at Ohio State."

The Nov. 24 date is open because that's when Notre Dame plays at Southern California, a game CBS would love to carry. Again, Notre Dame is a member of the CFA.

Starting times for the Oct. 13 double-header with Illinois at Ohio State and Washington at Stanford were listed as "TBA," or to be announced, because there could be conflicts with the World Series.

Seahawks switch date of opener

SEATTLE — The Seattle Seahawks announced yesterday they were switching the date of their regular season opener in the NFL that at least temporarily diffuses a standoff with the Seattle Mariners over who has first rights to the Kingdom.

The Seahawks said they would play their NFL opener against Cleveland on Sept. 3, a day later than scheduled.

"We are adamant in the fact that this does not settle potential future problems in regard to conflict in scheduling and the Seahawks, by taking this action, do not mean to imply such," said Seahawks' president and general manager Mike McCormack. He claimed the Seahawks' action was not "a concession."

Both the Seahawks and the Mariners claimed the Sept. 2 date. The American League baseball club filed a lawsuit earlier this month against the Seahawks and King County over the conflict.

King County Executive Randy Revelle called the Seahawks' announcement "very good news for the people of King County."

Mariners' spokesman Bob Porter said the Seahawks' announcement came as "a surprise" to his team's management. He said the news "caught us off guard. We didn't expect this."

Porter said Mariners' President Chuck Armstrong had to cut short a vacation and was flying back to Seattle to confer with Mariners' owner George Argyros and team lawyers.

Although Armstrong said the Mariners would drop the suit if it was awarded the Sept. 2 date, the team's chief lawyer said the Seahawks' decision to move their game would only part of the problem.

"We've held the position all along that the Sept. 2 conflict is the key issue in the case, but that the problem goes beyond this year," said Seahawks' lawyer Seattle. "We want to solve this issue of scheduling priority."

He added, "We're happy to get the Sept. 2 date, as we should, but the suit is still on." Tausend said a court hearing Aug. 14 in Ellensburg would be cancelled.

Gov. John Spellman, who signed the original contract to the scheduling conflict, said, "I think it's wonderful" of the Seahawks' announcement.

That was the solution I suggested to a couple of the owners of the Seahawks a few days ago," Spellman added. "It's a pretty obvious solution."

"It's Labor Day. A lot of people are gone on Sunday and a lot more are back in town on Monday. Labor Day is probably a better day for them (the Seahawks) any way."

Spellman signed the original contracts with both professional franchises when he was the King County Executive.

The announcement means the Mariners will be able to conclude a three-game series against the world champion Baltimore Orioles as scheduled.

"The best interest of the city of Seattle, we will move our game from Sept. 2 to Labor Day," McCormack said in a statement issued by the NFL club at its Kirkland offices. "However, this should not be taken in any way as a concession. We believe strongly in defending our 'use agreement' that was negotiated in 1975."

The NFL club has changed a scheduled game date to accommodate the Mariners.

McCormack said Seattle's team management cleared the arrangement with the NFL, the Browns and the television networks in hopes that King County and the Mariners could reach an agreement on a compromise scheduling program offered by the county.

"A lot of people have worked long and hard to make this move work," McCormack said. "We believe all sports franchises should be able to co-exist and do what is best for the good of the community."

The Mariners' suit, filed in Kittitas County Superior court, asked for an injunction to prevent the Sept. 2 date. The Mariners' suit asked the court to "restrain" or "cancel" their 20-year lease agreement with King County if it could not have the Sept. 2 date. The Mariners' lawsuit also asked for an injunction to prevent King County from filing a counter suit this week against the baseball club.

At a news conference following the Seahawks' announcement, Revelle said the NFL team had displayed "sportsmanship and responsible citizenship."

"It does not cost the taxpayers a dime," he said. Revelle said King County's lawsuit would not be dropped until the long-term lease agreement problem was settled with the Mariners.

Karl named new Cavaliers' coach

RICHFIELD, Ohio (AP) — George Karl officially became the youngest coach in the NBA when the Cleveland Cavaliers made the official announcement yesterday.

The elevation of Karl, 33, from director of personnel, had been widely speculated. And it had been reported that North Carolina Coach Dean Smith, who coached Karl in college, recommended his hiring to Cavaliers General Manager Harry Wetman.

Smith's interest was acknowledged by the Cavaliers, but Karl praised his former mentor as a vital influence on his life.

"The best decision I made in my life was to go to North Carolina because Dean Smith has had such an influence on me, both in basketball and in life," Karl said.

"He's the best basketball mind in the country. The things he taught me are in tune not only with basketball, but also with how to build a program and good human beings. I'm lucky to be his friend. Sixty-percent of my basketball philosophy comes from him."

Karl, the Cavaliers' eighth coach since Bill Fitch resigned in 1979, takes over the reins from Tom Nissalke, who was fired in May after compiling a 51-113 record over two years.

Wetman said the search for a successor to Nissalke was intensive.

"We went through the most lengthy screening process in NBA annals," Wetman said. "We worked it down to four candidates before going into even more lengthy analysis. Of this, George Karl emerged as the best candidate as coach of the Cavs."

"George is very flexible, very creative and with an abundance of basketball knowledge," Wetman said. "He has the drive and energy necessary to rebuild an organization like ours. He has the potential to be an outstanding coach."

Karl said he would make the Cavaliers an aggressive running team.
