Senate Superfund bill to be voted on

U.S. Senate majority leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., plans to bring a major Superfund bill to the Senate floor for a vote this week, the director of public affairs in the Senate Finance Committee said.

Sam Richardson said Senate Bill 51, a reauthorization of the 1980 Superfund Act, calls for \$7.5 billion in toxic waste clean-up funds over the next three years.

Superfund is the federal program developed to aid in the clean-up of toxic waste sites across the nation. The current \$1.6 billion, five-year program expires Sept. 30.


