

Confidence helps, but it takes more

With a perfect record, a No. 9 ranking by the Associated Press, and a week off to give the Alabama offense a chance to recover in time for the Alabama, what else could Coach Joe Paterno ask for?

Plenty, Paterno says.

"We're 4-0 and we had to fight to be 4-0," Paterno said. He added that while some good things have come out of their victories, "there's something that hasn't been done that needs to be done for us to keep winning."

Something sure to help Paterno in his pursuit of victories would be the return of tailback D.J. Dostler to the lineup. Dostler missed the last two games because of a hamstring injury, and Paterno said he has hopes that he'll be ready for the Crimson Tide.

All of which may not matter if the linemen in front of him don't heal as well. Paterno said he's reluctant to do much with offensive linemen Mitch Frelotte, Todd Moulas and Rob Smith in practice and risk injuring them.

And he's going to take a healthy Penn State to knock off the Tide which, like the Lions, is 4-0 and has this weekend off.

Paterno said Alabama has always presented a problem to Penn State. Last year's 60 loss at Tusculossa was his fifth loss in six tries against the Tide.

Paterno said the Tide's defense is as good as it was in 1978, when Paterno's team beat the ranked Lions 14-7, stopping Penn State with first and goal at the one in the process.

Improvement, Paterno said, is going to have to take place to defeat the Tide.

"We've got to try to be the football team against Alabama. I hoped we were going to be," Paterno said. "It may limit our ability to do certain things... We have got to be better to expect to win in the future."

Every week Paterno has said his team has to improve to win, and stressed the fact that the upcoming opponent was a good team. Despite what everyone else thought.

Well, in Alabama Paterno is up against a team that hasn't been done that needs to be done for us to keep winning."

But one discernible difference between this year's Lions and last season's team is that Paterno has said the team's confidence is good — to a point.

"I hope they're as good as they think they are," Paterno said. "They know each other better, there's more experience there, the leadership's a little stronger, and all of that gives them more confidence in themselves."

Teams from Fordham, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Princeton, Rhode Island, Rutgers, Syracuse and the University of Pennsylvania will also compete in the Rutgers Invitational.

This is the first year Wisconsin and North Carolina State have competed in the invitational. Last season's winner, Villanova, an arch rival of Penn State, chose not to schedule the match in 1985. Penn State finished second a year ago.

"I'm hoping that we'll be very competitive and really go after Wisconsin and North Carolina State," Jordan said.

Junior Holy Holt feels meeting tough teams early in the season could be an advantage as the season progresses.

"This will help us prepare for the quality of competition we will face later in the season," she said.

"And knowing that the competition is so tough will help everyone get psyched."

Rutgers' course is relatively flat compared to the others on which Penn State has run this season. Team Captain Kathy Kuhn thinks that could be a factor.

"This is nothing like what we ran (on at Western Ontario)," Kuhn said. "Western Ontario's course was covered with hills and there are hardly any at Rutgers."

Lady Lions expected to run in the varsity meet include Kuhn, Lohr, Stacy Pery, Kathy Plitcher, Lisa Ross and Amy Adams. The squad is so even that Jordan has yet to select the seventh runner.

"It's such a challenge to pick just seven runners when you have 12 or 14 with such equal abilities," Jordan said.

Kuhn feels the competition for the seventh spot is tough but friendly.

Lady harriers ready to take on field at invite

"I was standing in first base (with the Dodgers leading 6-1 in the fifth inning) when they were in the dugout. I was ecstatic. I even went three-for-three."
