During that period Peres was a leader of the Labor Party, which was the main opposition to the conservative Likud bloc led by Prime Minister Menachem Begin, who resigned in 1983. Peres now heads the uneasy. coalition government

The only Arab leader to meet publicly with Israeli officials was the late Egyptian president, Anwar Sadat, who signed the Camp David peace pact with Begin.




