

IFC completes new officer nominations

The Interfraternity Council completed its nominations for new officers at last night's meeting, IFC president John Rooney said.

Nominated for president are Dan Callahan (junior-economics) from Phi Mu Delta; Pat Conway (junior-political science) from Alpha Chi Sigma; Vinnie Delle (junior-finance) from Pi Kappa Alpha and Jeff Peters (senior-architectural engineering) from Alpha Chi Rho.

Nominated for the office of administrative vice president are Kraig Brown (junior-hotel restaurant and institutional management) from The-

ta Delta Chi; Karl Krause (junior-chemical engineering) from Sigma Chi and Pete Smith (sophomore-theater arts) from Alpha Chi Rho.

Running unopposed for Secretary/Treasurer is Geoff Blatt (junior-accounting) from Sigma Alpha Epsilon. Rooney said each of the nominees will be allowed to make speeches at the next IFC meeting Feb. 10 at Beta Sigma Beta. He said the nominees for president will be given six minutes to speak, and the other nominees will be given three and one-half minutes.

Elections will be held Feb. 24 at Acacia, Rooney said. Installation of

the new officers will be completed at the March 24 meeting.

In other business, Chapter Programs Chairman Dan Callahan said the IFC will hold a Server Liability/Alcohol Awareness program on Feb. 9 at 2 p.m. in 301 HUB.

Callahan said the goal of the project is to have every fraternity's pledge class attend the program. By repeating the program every fall and spring for the next four years, he said the entire greek system at the University will become educated on alcohol-related matters.



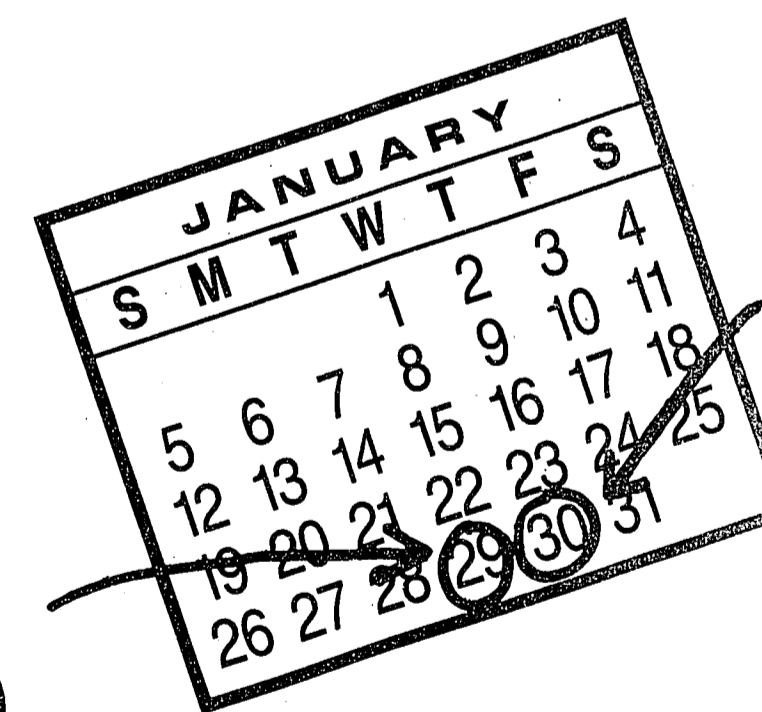
