

# Netmen notch two weekend victories

As the men's tennis team knows, it's always nice to get back on the winning track. After nabbing identical 7-2 victories yesterday at the Penn State Tennis Club over Mercyhurst College and Lafayette, the Lions have won their first five matches and have produced a 13-11 record with the Atlantic 10s (April 18-19) less than a week away.

Although the season began without a lot of wins — the Lions brought back a 4-8 record from their trip to the South and notched only two victories of their next seven matches — they seem to be getting back into the swing of things.

"We got off to a slow start, but after that everything went well," said freshman Glenn Leach, adding that the same was true of the win over Mercyhurst.

Both matches began with the doubles competition but that proved to be no disadvantage to the Lions. In their effort to avenge last season's 2-7 loss to Mercyhurst, Lee Spangnug and Dwayne Hultquist dropped the No. 1 match, but Oliver Sebastian and Leach combined efforts at No. 2 for a 4-2, 6-2 comeback victory. Adam Steinberg and Pat DeMarco also notched a win at No. 3 by scoring two 6-4s.

Winning continued to be the norm for the Lions on the singles courts, as Spangnug and Sebastian posted No. 1 (6-2, 6-1) and No. 2 (6-0, 6-3) victories. The Lions' second loss came at No. 3, where Hultquist dropped a three-set match. The fourth through sixth matches belonged to the Lions.

Spangnug posted another No. 1 singles win by shutting out the Leopard opponent, 6-0. Sebastian also took his second victory of the day at No. 2, 6-2, 6-1.

The Lions' only losses came at the No. 3 and No. 6 positions. Steinberg played No. 4 and Bill Dillard was called on at the No. 6 spot due to a back injury to Leach in the Mercyhurst match. Pat DeMarco rounded out the winning for the Lions at No. 5, posting a 7-5, 6-2 score.

# Softball team drops two to UConn

After participating against some of the best competition softball has to offer in the Lady Lion Invitational on Saturday, the women's softball team had to face another tough competitor in a double header against Connecticut at Lady Lion Field.

The hard-luck Lady Lions dropped a pair to the Huskies, both by scores of 1-0. Allen Polanis pitched both games yesterday, giving up only four hits in the first game and now again in the second.

Polanis had to pitch both games because Beth Devlin, the Lady Lions' other starting pitcher, was hit in the leg by a softball before game one started. Head Coach Sue Rankin said a preliminary report from the trainer indicated that Devlin fractured her tibia and would be out for the season. Devlin had been scheduled to pitch in the first game.

Rankin had already lost a starting pitcher from last year, Mary Butler, for academic reasons and now is down to Polanis and freshman Wendy Follweiler.

"It hurts (losing Devlin) — it seems like Murphy's law, everything that can go wrong this season is happening," Rankin said. "But the kids hung tough, and to play against a team like UConn and holding them 1-0, 1-0 was a good showing."

Connecticut walked onto Lady Lion Field with a 15-9 record and a No. 2 ranking in the Northeast Region. The Huskies finished third in Saturday's Lady Lion Invitational but did not play Penn State.

Both games were pitching duels and in the first game, the Huskies' Cherie Anderson scattered three Lady Lion hits to gain the win. Polanis allowed only one Connecticut run in the fourth inning.

With one out, two Huskie batters reached base; one on a walk and the other on a base hit. With these two on first and second, the next batter hit a ground ball to second. Second baseman Carolyn Withstander flipped the ball to shortstop Nan Schler. Schler attempted to complete the

double play, but her throw to first was off line. The runner that had been on second came around to score on the throwing error.

The second game's lone run came in the fourth. Polanis walked two

# Trackwomen post personal bests

If continued progress is any indication of future success, the women's track team is destined for an outstanding season.

In the two meets that it competed in this weekend — the Dogwood Relays and the Hoya Invitational — members of the team churned out several lifetime-best times and distances.

Head Coach Teri Jordan said everyone competed well and it is evident that everyone is getting stronger.

"I couldn't believe so many people had personal-best performances," Jordan said. "It just shows that we are definitely on schedule as far as training, and our strength should continue to improve for the Penn Relays (April 22-26), ECAC meet (May 16-18), and finally the NCAA meet (March 14-15)."

The Lady Lions began the Dogwood meet with both of their triple jumpers, Stephanie Gurysh and Veronica Hicks, posting lifetime-best distances.

Gurysh placed first with a length of 40-1/4. At the beginning of the season her goal was to reach 40 feet.

"I think a little bit of everything contributed to my jump," Gurysh said. "I've been training real hard and this is the toughest competition I've faced yet this year."

Hicks jumped shy of 40 feet with a second-place jump of 39-10.

Freshman Ernestine Marsh captured second place in the 400-meter hurdles with a personal-best 51.2 — slashing her time from last week by two seconds.

Marsh attributed her reduced time to the warmer weather and additional training, but said that she expected more of herself.

"I was hoping for :50.0 or better," she said. "The national qualifying time is :58, but I did it out two seconds which is good. So, I guess I'll

have to take things one step at a time."

Stacy Frey, the only team member to qualify for the NCAA meet prior to the Dogwood Relays, learned a lesson in strategy after placing seventh in the 300-meter run with a time of 9:30.2. Frey's best time in that event is 9:19.

"She went out too fast at the start of the race," Jordan said. "It's good for her to do that early in the season so she'll learn to run her own race and not anyone else's."

While part of the team was preparing for the start of the Dogwood meet, the rest of the team was busy holding its own at the Hoya Invitational.

The 4x100 relay placed second and the mile relay clinched first place, with a time of 3:48. The Penn State relay team, however, was later disqualified.

"They were disqualified because of a handoff outside of the passing zone," Jordan said. "I still considered this race very successful. Our team ran its best time and it's not even the official team. It's missing Carla Criste and Ernestine Marsh."

Mile relay team member Leslie Davis had exceptional performances in the two other events — the 400-meter hurdles and the 400-meter run. She placed fifth in the 400-meter run with a :57.8 and ran a :61.8 in the hurdles.

In the sprints, Marilyn Carter shone extra bright for Penn State by qualifying for the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference meet in the 200-meter dash with a fifth-place time of :24.3.

Carter also placed second in the 100-meter dash with a 1:22.

Liz Giering similarly ran both the 200- and 100-meter dashes and placed sixth in both with times of :26.4 and :22.29, respectively.

Probably the best event competition in either meet was the 800-meter run at the Hoya meet. The runners in that event included former Olympian Jo White and former All-Americans.

The three runners for the Lady Lions were Janice Carter (sixth place, 2:13.0), Pam Danley (fifth place, 2:13.5) and Lisa Ross (2:17.8). Ross also ran a 4:32 in the 1500-meter race earlier.

Lady Lions Dawn Higgins and An-tonette O'Carroll placed second and fourth in the high jump when they each jumped 5-5/8. That distance was also a personal record for O'Carroll.

The only double winner in the meet was thrower Connie Sweet, who hurled the discus 139-11 and threw the shot put 45-5.

Other highlights of the opening day included Reynier's victory in the shot put, a second-place finish by the 400-meter shuttle relay team (58.89), an outstanding performance by Eric Carter to place second in the 10,000-meter invitational race (28:42.8) and a second-place finish for Dave Conroy in the high jump (6-9).

Carter, one of only two collegians to finish in the top 10, was competing in his first-ever 10,000-meter run for the Lions and lost to Greg Orman of Team Etonic by just over one second.

Saturday was a day of both victory and disappointment for Penn State as the Lions did well in several events but also lost the 4x100-meter relay title due to a slip up by another runner which forced a Penn State runner off the track.

The sprint medley relay team of Bryant Littlejohn and Michael Timpon (200-meters), Sean Faust (400-meters) and Mills (800-meters) gave Penn State its second relay victory of the meet with a time of 3:21.40 to edge out Notre Dame and Tennessee by less than one second.

Other Penn State athletes who did well Saturday included Reynier placing fifth in the invitational shot put, and Paul Mackley placing fourth in the 3,000-meter stepphase (9:02.51).
