

Bias's death latest problem for Driesell

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — The death of All-American Len Bias is the latest in a series of controversies and scandals that have dogged University of Maryland basketball Coach Lefty Driesell, who now must contend with a grand jury and questions about alleged drug use on the team.

Driesell, 54, has not had a losing season since his first year as a college coach at Davidson in 1969. He is one of only 17 coaches to win 500 games with 10 or more years at a Division I school, and in his 17-year career at Maryland his teams have won 20 games on 11 different occasions while finishing in the Associated Press Top 20 eight times.

But Driesell's tenure has been spotted by a controversy. Most recently there has been speculation that Driesell instructed players how to respond to questions from reporters and police investigating Bias' death.

Driesell denies those rumors, but Prince George's County, Md., State's Attorney Arthur A. Marshall said, "If these rumors are wrong, we'll give him a chance to talk about it (at a grand jury hearing)."

Marshall said preliminary indications are that cocaine was in Bias' car the morning of his death. The prosecutor told The Associated Press this week that he will ask that Driesell, several basketball players and other students and friends answer ques-

tions from a grand jury about drug sales on the school's College Park campus.

Since Driesell took over the Maryland program in 1969 his teams have featured many players who went on to star in the NBA. But those squads also included:

- Herman Veal, who was accused of forcing sexual attentions on a coed in her dormitory room. Driesell was later the subject of a review panel after it was alleged he tried to call the student to pressure her to drop the complaint.
- Adrian Branch and Steve Rivers, who were arrested and charged with possession of marijuana.
- Bias, Jeff Baxter and John Johnson, who were suspended last season for missing curfew.

• And three players, including Bias last Thursday, who have collapsed and died of heart failure either during or after their collegiate careers. Owen Brown collapsed on Feb. 4, 1976, shortly after his graduation, and Chris Patton died April 1, 1978, of Marfan Syndrome only weeks after completing his sophomore season.

Driesell first came under fire following the Veal incident. After the woman charged Veal with the sex offense, Driesell allegedly telephoned the student three times on March 5, 1983. The woman was quoted in local newspapers as saying that Driesell told her that her "name would be dragged through the mud" if she did not drop her complaint against Veal.

Driesell later claimed the calls were made to obtain information on the case, and following an investigation by a three-member faculty committee he was simply reprimanded by Chancellor John B. Slaughter.

The director of Maryland's student legal aid office complained that Driesell should have been forced to resign.

"I'm an honorable man, I've got discretion," Driesell said at the time. "On Jan. 28, 1984, Branch and Rivers were arrested for possession of \$10 worth of marijuana. Driesell immediately suspended both from the team, but reinstated them after they were found guilty of misdemeanor possession and sentenced to a \$200 fine, 30 hours of community service and six months probation."

W. Germany takes on Cinderella role in Cup

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The French beat the defending World Cup champion Italians and pre-tournament favorite Brazil. Argentina knocked off South American champ Uruguay and well-regarded England. Belgium upset the Soviet Union and Spain.

Only West Germany has not been impressive en route to the semifinals of the world soccer championship.

But the Germans are there, and they will meet France on tomorrow at Guadalajara. The next game pits the surprising Belgians against Argentina at Aztec Stadium in Mexico City.

"We have not played up to our potential, especially when we attack," said West German Coach Franz Beckenbauer. "We need more organization on attack."

The Germans tied Uruguay, edged Scotland and

were beaten by Denmark in the opening round. Their second-place finish in Group E got them into the second round, against Morocco. It took them 88 minutes before they scored the game's only goal.

Against Mexico in the quarterfinals, West Germany's offense again floundered. The Germans finally prevailed in a shootout after 120 minutes of scoreless soccer in which the Mexicans clearly had the better of play.

"We must get our execution together," Beckenbauer said, noting that his team has scored just four goals in five games.

Still, no one in the German camp is shivering at the prospect of facing the European champions. In the 1982 World Cup semifinals, West Germany eliminated France on penalty kicks, then lost the final to Italy.

"The French are a very strong, very talented team, but I think we have a good chance," Beckenbauer said.

After beating Brazil 4-3 on penalty kicks Saturday,

the French players turned their attention to West Germany. Defender Patrick Battiston has his own memories of the Germans, particularly goalkeeper Harald Schumacher.

In the 1982 game, Battiston was charging in on a breakaway when Schumacher came out of the goal at full speed and crashed into Battiston with his knees and fists. Battiston was carried off on a stretcher and spent six months recovering from a broken jaw, broken teeth and vertebrae injuries.

"I don't think I will come anywhere near the German goal," Battiston said. "I don't plan to come closer than 40 meters. I'll be more prudent this time."

"I've paid my dues."

If West Germany beats France, it will have defender Thomas Berthold back for the finals. He was ejected from the quarterfinal when he hit Fernando Quirarte of Mexico. FIFA could have suspended him for two matches but chose to sideline him for just the semifinal.

Bookmakers unlucky in picking World Cup

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Britain's legal bookmakers, usually a reliable barometer of sporting potential, proved less than accurate when assessing the prospects of the 24 World Cup teams.

Belgium, France and West Germany, all of whom are only one game away from Sunday's final, were ranked as outsiders by Ladbrokes on the eve of the tournament.

Ladbrokes rated the French, European champions and beaten semifinalists four years ago in Spain, at a very generous 14-1 to win the title.

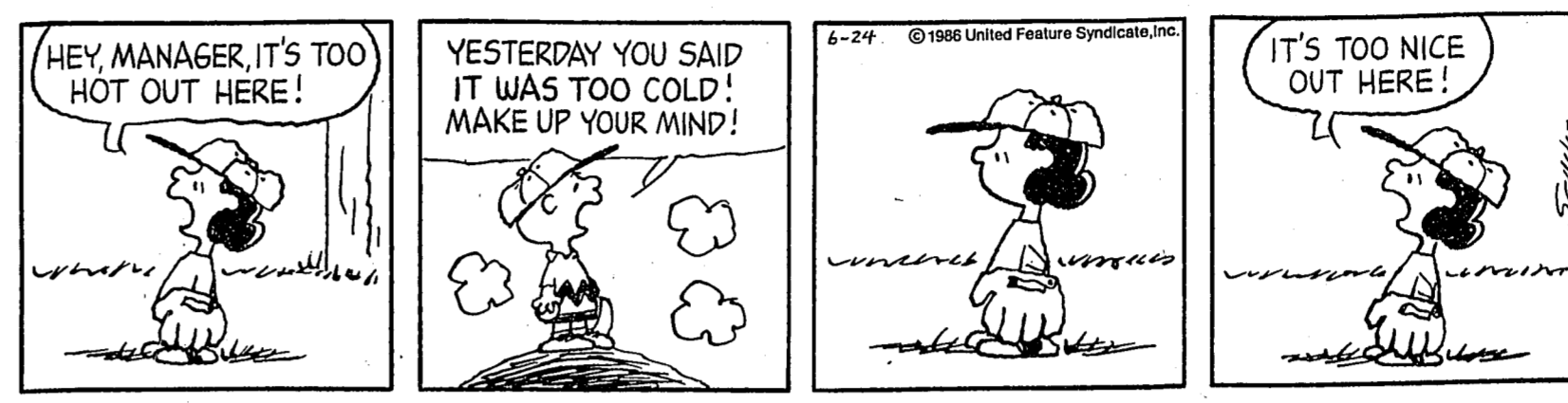
West Germany, two-time champion and beaten finalist in Spain, also was ranked at 14-1, presumably on the basis of its poor form in warm-up matches.

Argentina, bidding for its second title in eight years, was one of the

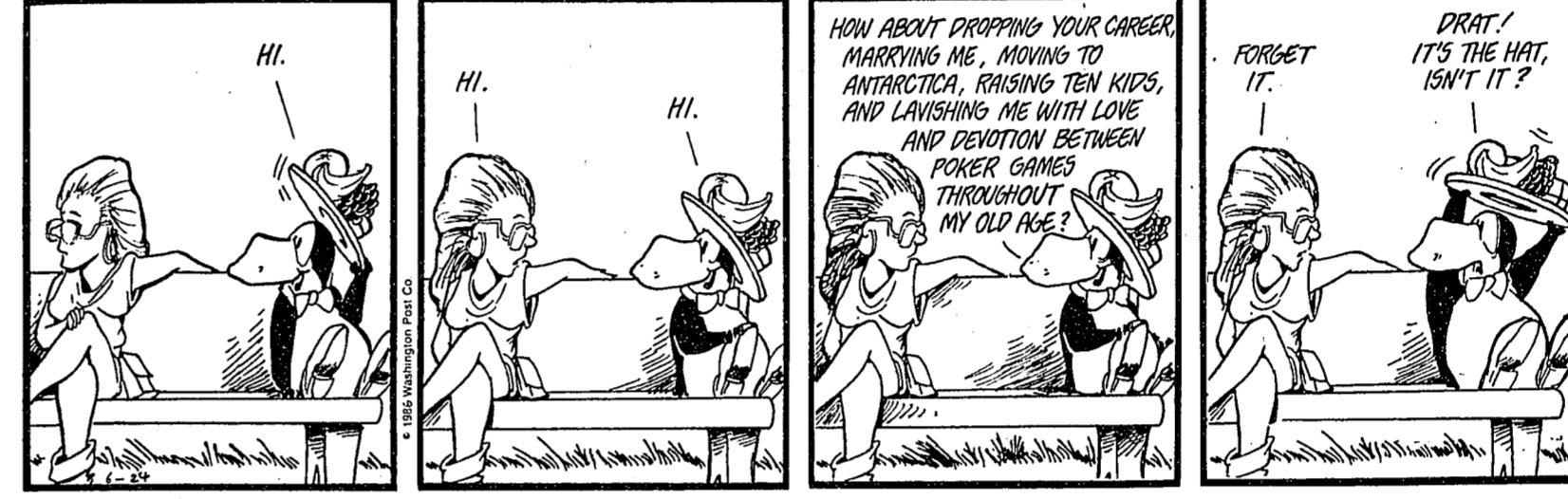
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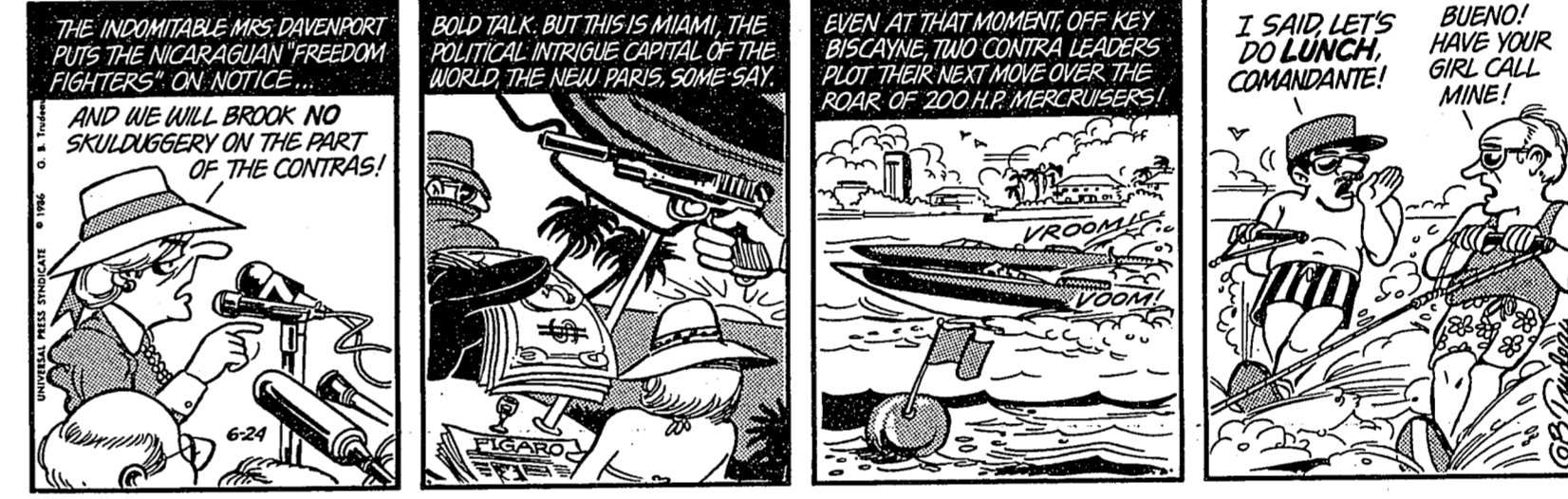

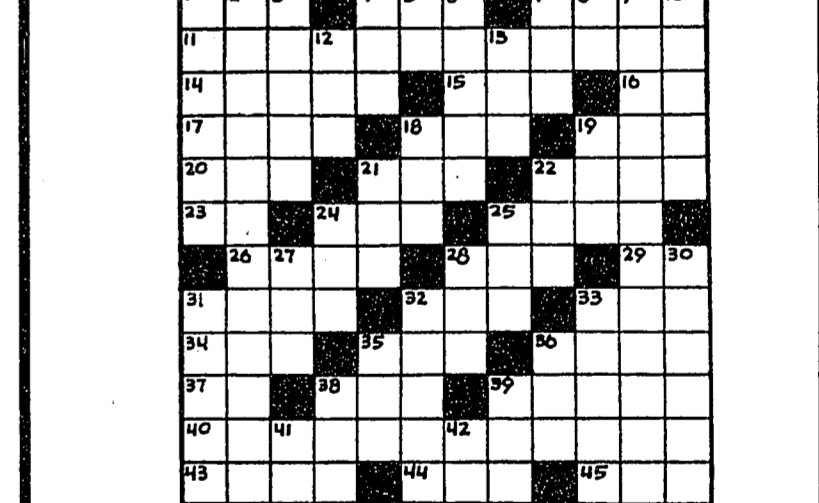
