



Actually, cornerback Vernon Wilkinson, another member of that class who was injured in an automobile crash last April, could play in 1987 if the NCAA grants him a special Slaughter, a 6-foot, 245-pounder from Bir-

mingham, became important to the defensive picture when Willie Ryles, a projected starter, died last Saturday of an acute subdural

Slaughter played linebacker and fullback in high school. As a redshirt freshman in 1983, Perkins' first season, he played tight end, nose guard and fullback for the scout team. 
