

Namibia vigil held on Friday

It's around 4 in the morning that the mind starts to do strange things and a protester wonders why he or she is sitting outside on a cold night instead of indoors where it's warm, said the president of the Committee for Justice in South Africa. "It's about then that you realize that you're

here for a reason. You're sitting here because what you believe in is right," said Stephanie Cooper was one of about 12 people holding a Cooper.

24-hour vigil on the steps of Old Main Friday night in protest of apartheid in Namibia. The vigil was the last part of a daylong protest for the country, also known as Southwest Africa. Namibia is administered by the South African government and consequently


