Wishful thinking. On first and 10 at the 26, I drop back and fire. I've never intended for Eric Hamilton. I have to unload quickly because coming at me like the 5-15 Special is Bennett. In one fell swoop, he slams me to the artificial surface. The ball falls like a wounded duck, incomplete.

On second and 10 from the 26, I roll out and find Brian Stierling cutting over the middle. The completion gains 15 yards to the Penn State 41 and I call my first time out. There's 1:36 remaining.

After the time out, I call two plays in the huddle and on first and 10, I drop a screen to Smith, but Alabama reads the play well and stops the fullback after a five-yard gain. I huddle-up quickly and roll left, where I spot Dozier open on the left sideline. I toss a lousy pass and overturn D.J. by a mile.

Time to re-group because it's third and five and Alabama is coming with everyone except Ray Perkins. I look at Bennett, who winks and flashes a menacing grin at me. Alabama finishes, a defensive end crosses the line of scrimmage and Penn State gets a first down at its own 46.

There's now 1:11 remaining and I've got to move the ball down the field. I drop back and see Hamilton double-covered. I pump fake to him and find Roundtree cutting across the middle. I fire the pass and Roundtree makes a diving grab. Gain of 17 and Penn State marches into Alabama territory at the Crimson Tide 37. I call the second time-out.

Afterwards, a draw to Dozier gains seven to the 30. On second down, I fade back and, under heavy pressure, fail to get the ball loose. I crumple under the Tide pressure and get sacked for a loss of six on the play. I'm forced to take the final timeout with 40 seconds left.

I go over to the sidelines where Head Coach Joe Paterno is livid. He begins to yell at me in words I've never heard of.

I still get the message and, with no timeouts, go out on the field. It's third and 9 from the Alabama 36. I drop back and find a wide open Dozier coming out of the backfield. I hit D.J. at the 28, and on sheer athletic ability, he lunges for a first down.

I hurry up the offense and throw a quick sideline pattern to Hamilton, who steps out at the 19. There's now 23 seconds left.

From the 19, I drop back looking for a receiver, but with no one open I scramble out of the pocket and race for the sidelines. As I'm just about to reach the sidelines, Bennett clocks me.

I get up slowly, woozy from the hit. The team doctors come over to me and check to see if I'm coherent.

"Where are you?" trainer Jerry Slagle says.

"Auntie M, Auntie M, where's Toto?" I say. "You're not going to hurt my Toto, you . . . witch."

"How many fingers am I holding up," Slagle says.

"Eleven," I reply.

"Who are you?"

"Touchdown," yells ABC's Keith Jackson. "Whatta gutsy call," says Frank Broyles, who's still working for ABC (again, it's my dream, I make the rules).

As I leave the field, I see Bennett with his head hanging low. I give him a wink, start laughing and then run for the locker room because the crowd stands as one, cheering their Crimson Tide on.

I take the snap from center, trot three paces back and then start piling it in high gear towards the end zone. I see an opening, the goal line is but three yards away. I lunge and . . .

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It's second down at the 4, time for two more plays. I take the snap from Keith Brooking and left a spiral towards the right corner of the end zone. Hamilton leaps up, but the Alabama defender bats the ball away. Incomplete. There are three seconds remaining.

"What's the game. I'm thinking this is what separates the men from the boys, the broccoli from the cauliflower."

I tell the offense in the huddle that our destiny lies here. We're only four yards away from daylight. I call the play myself — a quarterback draw.

"What's never going to work."

"Shut up," I say, trying to stop myself at full breath because I just told a 6-6, 272-pound offensive guard to shut up. "It's going to work."

We break from the huddle and approach the line of scrimmage. The crowd stands as one, cheering their Crimson Tide on.

King Buddy speaks: Ryan dubs Cunningham Eagles second-team QB

PHILADELPHIA — Philadelphia Eagles Coach Buddy Ryan elevated Randall Cunningham to the No. 2 quarterback job yesterday, but emphasized that Ron Jaworski could feel secure.

Ryan, at his weekly Monday news conference, said Jaworski will start Sunday against the San Diego Chargers if he has regained feeling in two fingers on his throwing hand. The injury, which he suffered a week ago against the Giants, kept him from starting Sunday.

If Jaworski isn't healthy, second-year quarterback Randall Cunningham gets the job, and Matt Cavanaugh drops from backup to third string, Ryan said.

Ryan said Cunningham had a good job Sunday in the Eagles' 17-14 loss to the Dallas Cowboys. "But I think Jaworski will be able to play," he said.

Ryan emphasized that Cunningham wasn't ready to leap over Jaworski for the No. 1 job. "You guys (media) try to rush him too quick," said the coach.

Cavanaugh, who cost the Eagles No. 2 and 3 draft choices in a trade with the San Francisco 49ers, was unable to play for a week because he had a white back. The Eagles collected just 62 yards total offense in the first half, 59 rushing and 3 passing.

Cunningham started the second half trailing 7-0, led a drive to tie the score, and, after Dallas regained the lead, 14-7, directed another scoring move to tie it at 14.

He scored on a 14-yard scramble and threw a 15-yard TD pass to Mike Quick. He completed eight of 15 for 127 yards.

Ryan made a point of explaining that Dallas' 10 sacks were not the fault of the offensive line alone.

"They were caused by formation problems, holding the ball too long. You know you can only hold that thing so long. Then you have to throw it away. Also not reading the coverage right, not getting rid of it on the blitz," he said.

Ryan blamed the fullback Mike Adick for one sack, tackle Leonard Mitchell for a half, guard Ron Baker for two, wide receiver Kenny Jackson for one, Cavanaugh for two and Cunningham for three.

Ryan said Cunningham has matured since the start of the season.

Harriers disappointed with finish at Classic

Some cross country coaches will fret for second best, but not Harry Groves. After a second-place finish last weekend at the Syracuse Cross Country Classic, the Penn State coach showed concern.

With the Atlantic 10 playoffs coming up Saturday, Groves said his team has its work cut out for it.

"We better get our team together in the back end of the group or we'll get smashed," he said.

Bucknell won the weekend meet with 31 points, followed by the Lions with 42 and the University of Western Ontario with 92. Syracuse had 11 points, while Millersville had 137 and the Mohawk Valley Cross Country Club had 157 to round out the scoring.

Penn State's American Eric Carter won the 5.2 mile race in 26:49, establishing a record at the Drumlins Golf course. The winner of Carter's third in four mile races — arranged a third-place finish at the University of Minnesota Burger King Classic on Oct. 11.

Sophomore Brian Laird placed fourth at 27:18, while senior captain Rick McGarry finished eighth at 27:50. Other Penn State scorers included Keith Jenricks (14th in 28:11), Bill McCafferty (15th in 28:12), Jay Novak (16th in 28:29), Pat Singletary (21st in 28:39), Steve Bakley (24th in 28:39), Tom Gough (25th in 28:43) and Doug Walter (26th in 28:41).

For the second straight race, Penn State has had to run without David McMillan, out indefinitely with an ankle injury.

Since Penn State and Bucknell are generally considered the top teams in the east, whenever the two teams meet it is a close contest.

"It's kind of disappointing," Carter said of the loss. "We've got a good team, but I think we have an even better team."

Carter added that a lack of concentration may have kept the Lions from winning the race.

"We've got to concentrate more in racing," he said. "We've been training well, but we're going to have to take that training onto the field."
