

After five tries, the Phillies finally get a victory

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Facing hard-throwing Lee Smith isn't an easy thing for any batter, but the Phillies' Glenn Wilson felt good at the plate in the 10th inning of yesterday's game against the Chicago Cubs.

Wilson's bases-loaded single to right field with one out scored Juan Samuel and gave the Phillies a 9-8 victory over the Cubs. The victory was the Phillies' first of the season after four losses.

"I was pretty relaxed," Wilson said. "I just hoped he wasn't going to blow me away with a high fast ball."

"It took us a while but it feels good," Phillies Manager John Felske said of the 3-hour, 53-minute game. "That wasn't a struggle, it was a heart attack. You just never know in this game."

Chicago Manager Gene Michael was pleased with the way his team came back in the ninth inning. "It was great to come back like we did and a real tough one to lose," he said.

"I thought Von Hayes did a good job against Smith in the 10th inning. He's really a tough out."

Hayes had five hits and knocked in two runs for Philadelphia, a winner for the first time after opening the season with four losses.

Reliever Steve Bedrosian, 1-0, picked up the victory despite allowing three runs on homers by pinch hitter Jerry Mumphrey and Leon Durham, that tied the game, with two outs in the ninth.

Samuel walked to lead off the 10th against Smith, 0-1, and moved to third on a double by Hayes. Mike Schmidt was intentionally walked, leading the bases. Pinch hitter Ron Roenicke struck out before Wilson lined a

single to right field through a drawn-in infield.

Bedrosian struck out the first two batters in the top of the ninth, but walked Jody Davis. Mumphrey homered to left-center to make it 8-7, and Leon Durham followed by hitting a 2-pitch into the first row of the upper deck in right to tie the score.

Samuel had three hits and three RBIs, including a two-run fourth-inning triple that snapped a 3-0 tie against Greg Maddux, who gave up six runs and nine of Philadelphia's 16 hits.

Phillies' starter Shane Rawley singled with one out in the third and moved to third on Milt Thompson's double. Samuel then tripled to right and scored on a single by Hayes.

The Phillies added two more runs in the sixth on a sacrifice fly by Schmidt and Mike Esslar's RBI single.

The Cubs had taken a 2-0 lead in the first on Keith Moreland's RBI double and a run-scoring single by Davis.

The Phillies went ahead 3-2 in the third when Thompson walked, stole second, and scored on Samuel's single.

Softball team drops two at soggy tournament

For the fourth time in eight years the victor at the Lady Lion Softball Invitational was not a team, but Mother Nature.

Although the Adelphi University Panthers were crowned champions, rain forced the cancellation of all but two of yesterday's games at Dreubibus Complex (Hess Field) in Shingletown.

The weather was the main topic of conversation throughout the tournament. After Friday's games, the tournament directors debated playing both Saturday and Sunday's games on Saturday. The weather forecast was promising, though, and they decided to go ahead as planned on Sunday.

Only two of four games were completed yesterday and the remainder of the tournament was

cancelled as it was in 1981, '84, and '85. Last year it was not cancelled, but the teams faced the snow which fell throughout the tourney.

In the two games completed, Penn State (14-14) dropped a 4-0 decision to Bloomsburg (in the loser's bracket) and Adelphi played Akron (the only two undefeated teams at that point) and defeated it by the same score to gain its second Lady Lion Invitational title.

The Lady Lions' loss, their second to Bloomsburg in three days, knocked them out of the tournament.

During inter-pool play on Friday the Huskies defeated the Lady Lions 10-0 behind the pitching of All-American Sue Koehler. Koehler allowed just two hits in six innings.

Yesterday's game again featured Koehler's pitching as she scattered five hits in seven innings.

In the first inning of that game, Penn State mounted a serious scoring threat as Deb Bryan started the inning with a single and was moved to third on Julie Reed's sacrifice bunt. Nan Sicler then drew a walk. Eileen Roach followed, but popped up to the shortstop.

Designated hitter Karen Schilling followed and also drew a walk, loading the bases for Tammy Irvin. The Lady Lions were not able to capitalize though as Irvin grounded out to the shortstop.

After this first inning threat, the team didn't advance a runner past second base for the rest of the game.

Bloomsburg meanwhile struck early, scoring two runs on three hits in the first off of Aileen Polanski.

Polanski then settled down and pitched "excellently" according to

Assistant Coach Beth Perine. "From that point (first inning) on, she was excellent. I was really pleased," Perine said.

Perine also complimented the work of Julie Reed, who was filling in behind the plate for injured starter Melinda Silva. Silva suffered a deep thigh bruise during Saturday's game with C.W. Post but may be able to play tomorrow against Temple. Right now her status is "day to day" according to the coaching staff.

After the game, Bloomsburg Head Coach Jan Hutchinson talked about the key to her team's victory.

"They didn't really give her (Sue Koehler) much credit after Friday's game. Maybe they'll give her some more credit now. Also we were enthusiastic and we didn't make many errors," Hutchinson said.

Head Coach Sue Rankin characterized Koehler as a "smart pitcher."

"She doesn't have much, but what she does have she does well," Rankin added.

In the 'championship game' between Adelphi and Akron, Panthers' pitcher Julie Bolduc allowed only three hits in seven innings, striking out six along the way.

Adelphi scored one run in the fourth when Lori Mongillo drew a walk and Robin Bartholomew tripled her home.

The Panthers added three more runs in the fifth to insure the victory.

With this weekend's games, the Lady Lions were unable to climb above the .500 mark and Head Coach Sue Rankin says she expects her team to start playing more consistently soon.

Spikers shatter Buckeyes' upset hopes with 3-0 win

In its final match before the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association championships, No. 4 Penn State got some needed competition from the Midwest's strongest team, Ohio State.

However, the crowd of 2,500 on hand at Meadville High School was unable to witness the upset as the Lions dumped the No. 11 Buckeyes 15-12, 15-5 and 15-7. Penn State improves its record to 24-3 with the win.

Senior middle-hitter Jose Rubayo called the performance a good one overall for Penn State.

"In general, we played a good match," Rubayo said. "We were able to get the guys off the bench into the game and they did a good job for us."

The Lions were slow in getting out of the gate, which accounted for the 12 Ohio State points in game one. But once Penn State got in

the flow the Buckeyes proved to be little competition.

"They are a nice team and they have some really good athletes," Rubayo said. "But they haven't reached the level of competition that we have through the hard work we put in day in and day out."

Rubayo also noted that OSU didn't seem to give itself a chance from the start.

"In talking to some of their players before and after the game, it sounded like they came into the game with the attitude that they couldn't beat us," Rubayo said. "They gave us a tough battle in the beginning, but when we showed them we were going to be tough to beat, they just seemed to give up."

Rubayo said the key to holding OSU to just 12 total points in games two and three was the fact that Penn State played as a team rather than playing individually.

"The thing we have to do to be successful is play as a unit," he said. "When we are out

there playing as a team, we have a good time and, consequently we play better. If we play individually, we don't get our tempo going and we can get into trouble."

Freshman setter John Wasielewski, who came in for starter Javier Gaspar, said the defensive game was on in general, but the blocking aspect still needs work.

"Defensively we covered the floor well," Wasielewski said. "And our blocking game was strong, but it still isn't where it could be."

Wasielewski also added that it was good to see all 12 players get on the floor, especially from a personal standpoint.

"The guys who came off the bench played well," he said. "I particularly like coming in for (Gaspar). After sitting and watching him play for a while, I feel like I'm ready to go in and take over."

Wasielewski and Gaspar combined to lead a powerful offense, which was highlighted by Chris Chase's 22 kills and Rubayo's 11. The

match also saw the Lions serve up five aces, with Chase, Gaspar, outside hitters Dave Bittner, Rob Pierce and Keith Yarras each getting one.

Though the blocking game was not where the team wanted it, Chase added five solo blocks to his stat sheet while Rich Zemba middle blocker stuffed two.

Since this is the last time Penn State will face an opponent before this weekend's EIVA tourney, the team would have liked to get in some solid competition. OSU fell apart at the end, but Rubayo said it provided better opposition than the Lions would find in the East.

"OSU gave us better competition than we will find in the first round of the EIVAs," Rubayo said. "It's good to have that kind of competition. It will better prepare us if we face Wasielewski again."

"Ohio State is one of the tougher teams we play," he said.
