Seven upsets featured in weekend picks

Having grown up near Augusta. Ga., Pat Dye knows something about Amen Corner, the famous stretch of holes 10-11-12-13 where the Masters golf tournament often is decided.

According to Dye, his sixth-ranked Auburn Tigers (6-0-1) are about to begin their own version of Amen Corner with games 8-9-10-11. It starts Saturday night against No. 10 Florida (5-2), followed by No. 4 Florida State (6-1), No. 12 Georgia (6-2) and No. 16 Alabama (5-2).

Florida is the only Southeastern Conference team to have a winning record (4-2) over the Tigers in Dye's previous six years at Auburn, so it's no wonder that he says, "We haven't played a team like Florida yet. I think Florida is better than Tennessee I think we have four teams left to play that are better than Tennessee (Auburn and Tennessee tied 20-20 in September)

Florida has won three in a row from Auburn but the Tigers are a 312-point favorite. The pick is . . . Auburn 24-17.

Last week's prediction record was 31 right, 15 wrong and one tie for a percentage of .674; for the season, 241-104-5 for a .699 percentage. Against the point spread, last week's mark was 15-19-0 for .441; for the year, 103-124-5 for .454.

Saturday's only other game between members of the Associated Press Top Twenty finds No. 20 Michigan State at No. 15 Ohio State, which is favored by four points.

Tulane at No. 4 Florida State (by 28): FSU's only other game on Halloween was a 42-0 loss to Georgia in 1959. History doesn't repeat . . . Florida State 49-24.

No. 5 LSU (by 13^{1}_{2}) at Mississippi: The 1959 Halloween game featured the most famous play in LSU history as Billy Cannon returned a punt 89 yards for the only touchdown in a 7-3 victory . . . LSU 28-17.

No. 7 UCLA (by 612) at Arizona State: The Bruins are 3-0 in Sun Devil Stadium and are out to avenge last year's 16-9 loss. ASU must win to have a shot at returning to the Rose Bowl. Upset Special of the Week . . . Arizona State 31-24.

Pitt may use secret weapon vs. Orange

 ${\bf PITTSBURGH~(AP)-The~University~of~Pitts-}$ burgh, which struggled offensively in a 10-6 victory over Navy, may have a secret weapon for Saturday's home game against No. 8 Syracuse: the shotgun.

The Panthers, 5-2, have been experimenting with the shotgun offense for several weeks, but didn't use it in last Saturday's game at Navy.

"It's just something we're trying out. I don't know if we'll use it," said Pitt Coach Mike Gottfried, who indicated the Panthers might use the spread offense on third-down passing situa-

Gottfried, who also has hinted the Panthers ried has said he doesn't want to enter the 1988 may show Syracuse (7-0) some other new offensive wrinkles, has been practicing freshman quarterback Darnell Dickerson at times with his first-team offense, although senior Sal Genilla remains his starter.

Gottfried has not ruled out playing Dickerson this year, although he had hoped to redshirt the former Detroit high school star.

"The only position we might cash in a redshirt this season is quarterback," Gottfried said.

Genilla's backup, redshirt freshman Larry Wanke, has played little this season and Gottf-

season with an untried quarterback.

Syracuse, off to its best start since it was 10-0 and won the national championship in 1959, is a 412 point favorite for Saturday's 2:45 p.m. game, which will be televised nationally by CBS.

Pitt has a 24-16-2 edge in the lifetime series between the two Eastern rivals, but Syracuse has won the last three games: 13-7 in 1984, 12-0 in 1985 and 24-20 last season.

Pitt hasn't beaten Syracuse since walk-on kicker Pat Viancourt's last-minute field goal edged the Orangemen 13-10 at Pitt in 1983.


