

12 Pennsylvanians killed over holiday

Police were looking Sunday for the driver of a stolen van that struck and killed a 19-year-old Bucks County woman, one of 12 people reported killed on Pennsylvania roads during the Thanksgiving holiday.

Mary Sue Johnson was hit after she got off a bus and began crossing the street near her home Friday night, police said. A witness told police that the driver, who was following the bus, tried to pass it and struck Johnson. She was pronounced dead at the scene.

The van had been stolen from Meenan Oil Co. earlier Friday and was found abandoned about a mile away, police said.

In Philadelphia, Ellen Joy Hanna, 30, of Philadelphia, was killed about 2:30 a.m. Sunday, when her car was rear-ended on U.S. 1 by a vehicle driven by Gary James Dellaguardia, 31, of Ambler, police said.

Authorities said victims of other Pennsylvania accidents during the holiday weekend included:

nople, whose pickup hit two trees and overturned Saturday in Butler County.

- Anthony K. Werkheiser, 18, of Easton, a passenger in a car that hit a tree stump Saturday in Northampton County.

- Margaret Kelly, 68, and her son, James G. Kelley Sr., 49, both of Crucible, when an empty lumber truck hit their car Friday in Greene County.

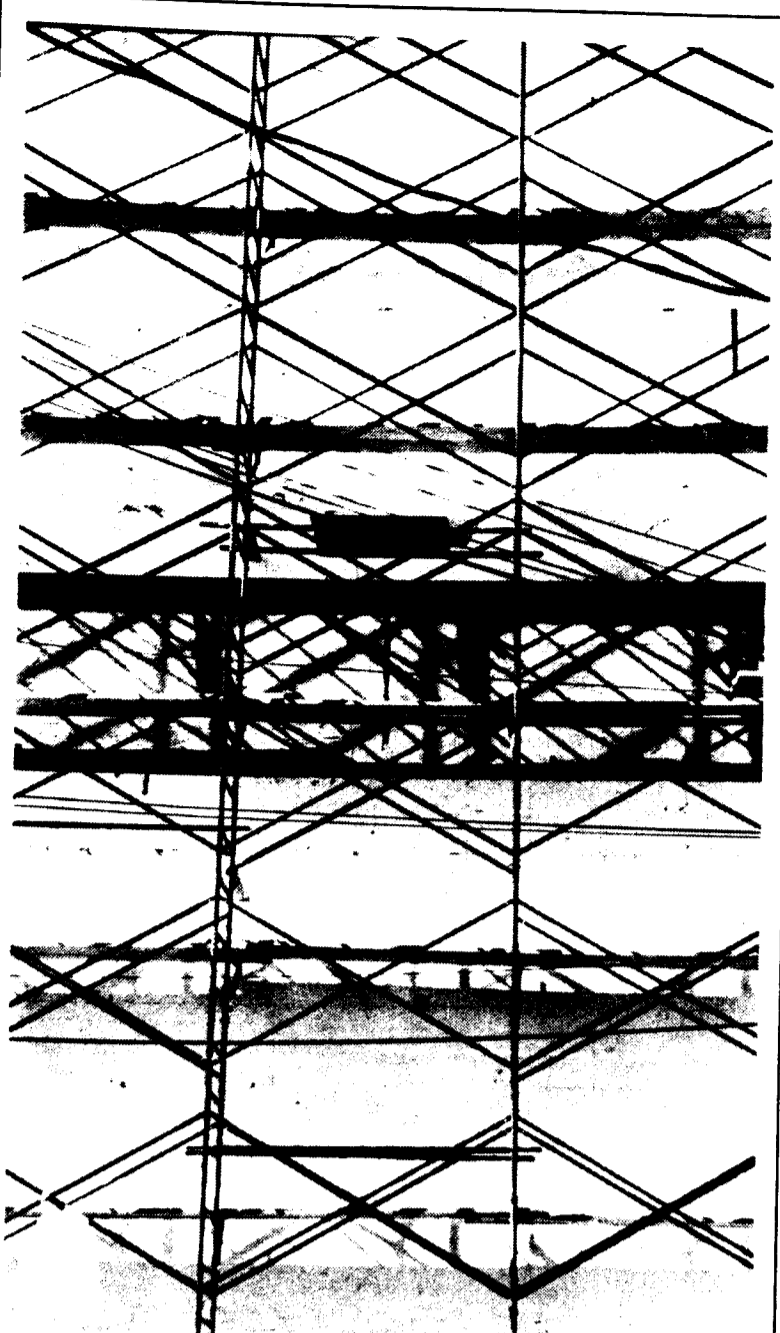
- Chalmer Dull, 86, of Scottdale, hit by a car while walking across a road Friday in Westmoreland County.

- Rodney J. Campbell, 33, of Roaring Branch, Wednesday night in Lycoming County.

- Michael Weiland, 40, of Throop, Thursday in Lackawanna County.

- Robert C. Price, 62, of Tyrone, Thursday in Lycoming County.

- Steven Todd Ronan, 21, of Mountain Top, Thursday in Luzerne County.

KKK: Krishnas unwanted

JIM THORPE, Pa. (AP) — Ku Klux Klan members holding a rally during the weekend threatened "trouble" if the Hare Krishna sect attempts to build a walled city in Carbon County.

"We're here to let the people know in this white, Christian town that we don't want the cow worshipers up on that mountain," a hooded organizer said.

The rally Saturday drew five robed Klansmen and several others in street clothes.

Hare Krishna members recently said they were considering purchasing the 400-acre Flagstaff Mountain

Park in Jim Thorpe for a walled city for 12,000 people.

The Klansmen, from neighboring Schuylkill County, said they came to Jim Thorpe to show their support for local efforts to stop the Krishnas from buying the property.

"If the cow worshipers get that mountain, all hell could break loose," the Klansman said.

The Klan organizer said his group was encouraged to rally in Jim Thorpe after hearing a speech by Republican state Sen. James Rhoades at a public meeting last week.




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Winter to be a repeat of 2 years ago

WASHINGTON, D.C. — This winter may be something like a rerun of two years ago, according to the National Weather Service:

- Wet and stormy on the East Coast.

- Cold from the Appalachians to the Great Plains.
- Warm and dry in the Southwest and warm along the coast of Oregon and Washington.

These predictions are partly the result of expected changes in wind patterns, said Donald L. Gilman, the chief long-range forecaster for the

National Weather Service. The predictions include:

- The eastward-bound winter storm track from Texas through Georgia will start over the Gulf of Mexico instead of Texas.
- Wind that normally blows storms onto the Pacific Coast from the West will turn northward and

blow them more onto the Pacific Coast of Canada.


- The wind that normally blows out of Canada from northwest to southeast into the U.S. Midwest will blow more from north to south.

The gulf origin of East Coast storms means they will carry much more moisture than normal.

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
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
