 The team is exactly where it wanted to be after five games, and at each practice they are very much not "lax" as they focus on getting where they still want to go. This is their stiffest test to date, and Diaco doesn't know if the Hawkeyes are good enough to handle it, but, "I know this," he said, "we're working extremely hard."
 Penn State Coach Joe Paterno seems to think that has paid off. He said this is an excellent Hawkeye

team, nothing like the one the Lions pounded 63-21 in Beaver Stadium a year ago.
 "We expect a very, very tough football game," Paterno said.
 That will not be anything new to the Lions, as their last three games have been decided by a total of 14 points. Two of those games were consecutive losses, 17-9 to Wisconsin and 28-25 to Ohio State. Coming after 20 straight wins, the Lions' morale sunk and their confidence was challenged. But a 26-23 win

over Purdue last week, despite five turnovers, has the Lions smiling again.
 "I think our confidence did sag a little, but we basically just said if we want to salvage the season we have to go out, win the rest of our games and win the bowl game," hero Clint Holes said. "The feeling may have been down, but it's back up now."
 To keep it there, Paterno said the Lions (4-2, 1-2 Big Ten) must avoid handing the ball over to an oppor-

tunistic team that has forced eight turnovers through five games. And Holes and the rest of the Lion defense will have to stop a potent Iowa offense. Quarterback Matt Sherman has the 16th-highest quarterback rating in the nation, completing 53 of 95 passes for 905 yards. The more important statistic, though, is the number of games the Hawkeyes have lost when Sherman starts under center — zero.
 Tailback Sedrick Shaw is also a major threat, piling up 713 yards

on 131 carries for 142.6 yards per game, the fifth-best average in the country. But in a 21-7 win over Michigan State two weeks ago, Shaw pulled a groin muscle and But Lion defensive tackle Brandon Noble wants Shaw to lace on his pads Saturday.
 "Hopefully he's in there," Noble said, "because I don't want them to have any excuses when we win."
 As if the Hawkeyes needed any more bulletin board material. The 63-21 score is still fresh in their

minds and will provide plenty of motivation for Fry's squad — motivation to beat a ranked opponent for the first time since 1991.
 "They've got a couple of losses already in the Big Ten so I would imagine this would be an extremely tough game," the veteran coach said.
 "They just clobbered us last year. So our youngsters, they're feeling pretty good right now and they're looking forward to the game."

Bay Area football without star hurlers for Sunday gridiron action

EL SEGUNDO, Calif.— Now, both Bay Area teams will have to carry on their Super Bowl aspirations using backup quarterbacks.

The Oakland Raiders' Jeff Hostetler has a compression fracture of the cricoid — the protective cartilage of the windpipe just below the voice box — and will miss Sunday's game against the Indianapolis Colts.

The Raiders (5-2), who have a bye after facing the Colts (4-2) at the Oakland Coliseum, didn't immediately say on Thursday how long Hostetler will be sidelined, just that he wouldn't play this weekend.

After Sunday's game, the Raiders are idle until Nov. 5, when they play at Cincinnati.

Earlier this week, the San Francisco 49ers learned that Steve Young would be out about four weeks because of a badly bruised throwing shoulder. Elvis Grbac is Young's replacement.

Hostetler and Young are the latest on the long list of injured NFL quarterbacks who are or have been sidelined, joining Dan Marino, Stan Humphries, Boomer Esiason, Neil O'Donnell, Drew Bledsoe, Chris Chandler, Troy Aikman, Chris Miller and Heath Shuler.

Dr. Stephen Bayley, an orthopedic surgeon at the Sports Medicine Clinic of Pomona Valley Hospital, said Hostetler's

return to action will be dependent on when the swelling subsides.

"I would hope you're only talking a week," Bayley said. "It could go longer. I don't think healing is a consideration; the concern is of the local swelling that might compromise his windpipe."

"If I returned him to play, I would try to get some hard protection for the front of his neck — if that were possible without limiting his neck motion. You couldn't limit a quarterback's neck mobility, so you couldn't put him in a brace."

Hostetler will be replaced at quarterback by Vince Evans, at 40 the second-oldest player in the NFL behind St. Louis Rams tackle Jackie Slater, who hasn't played yet this season, but is expected to

be activated at some point. Slater is 41.

"This is what it's all about," said Evans, who has completed 8 of 18 passes for 143 yards and one touchdown with one interception in limited action this year. "I'd like to think there's not much of a dropoff when I come into the game, that the machine just continues to roll."

The machine stopped dead in the most recent Raiders game, a 27-0 loss at Denver on Monday night. Hostetler was injured late in the first quarter when he was hit by Denver linebacker Dave Wyman, who was ejected and later fined \$4,000 by the NFL.

Hostetler didn't leave the game until late in the third quarter when his voice weakened, and spent the night in a Denver-area hospital before returning to California.

"I don't think it's a dramatic adjustment, because we have a veteran quarterback," quarterbacks coach Jim Fassel said before practice Thursday. "You're not talking about a real young guy without a lot of experience. Vince and Hoss are very similar, both are bright, have been in the league, know how to prepare and have a lot of ability."

Tim Brown, the Raiders' leading receiver with 34 catches for 516 yards and four touchdowns, said the quarterback change "doesn't change a thing."

"We all know what Vinny can do," Brown said. "If anything, as receivers, we just have to adjust to the velocity of the ball, because Vinny throws a considerably harder ball."
