■ **Disorderly conduct:** A fight between members of Phi Gamma Delta fraternity, 319 N. Burrowes Road, and Pi Lambda Phi fraternity, 321 Fraternity Row, yesterday morning left at least two people injured, the State College Police Department said.

One man was punched in the nose and had blood on his shirt, police said, and another man had a cut above his left eye.

The first report of the fight showed 50 people were involved, but the second report showed 10 people were involved, police said. When police arrived at Pi Lambda Phi, the scene of the reported fight, they only found people scattering.

The investigation is continuing, police said.

Three killed, two injured in Phila. drug shooting

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Four men searching for drug money sprayed a North Philadelphia home with bullets, killing three people and injuring two others early yesterday morning, police said.

The men knocked on the door at about 1 a.m. When someone answered, the men forced themselves inside and began shooting, police said.

Kevin Boyd, 24, was pronounced dead at the Medical College of Philadelphia Hospital at 1:35 a.m. Tremaine Wilson, 24, and Abdul Lopez, 25, were pronounced dead at the scene. All the victims are from Philadelphia. Autopsies were planned.

A man and a woman were in undisclosed hospitals in serious condition, Sgt. Theresa Campana said.

said. Both had been shot in the stomach multiple times, she said. She would not release their names.

All five people were found on the first floor, police said. Two of the dead were lying in the living room and one was in the kitchen, police said.

Police believe the gunmen left with a large amount of drug money, although they were not specific.

"All we know at this point is there was something related to drugs and that there was a lot of money at this property," Campana said.

The suspects were at large. They were described only as four black men between ages 20 and 25.

Judges push for law and order, debate mandatory sentencing

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Republican Michael Barrassé says he favors mandatory sentences, especially in drunk driving and child sex abuse cases.

Democrat Russell Nigro says judges should have some discretion while Democrat John Musmanno says a "blend" of mandatory sentences and judicial discretion is best.

Republican Sandra Schultz Newman says she thinks the certainty of mandatory sentences in drunk driving cases will lead people to think twice about drinking and driving.

Republican State Committee has pushed a law-and-order theme in this year's races for Supreme, Superior and Commonwealth courts. Voters will pick two jus-

ices and one judge each for the other two appellate courts.

Newman is a Commonwealth Court judge and Barrassé is the district attorney for Lackawanna County. Both Nigro and Musmanno are Common Pleas Court judges.

Mandatory sentences were one of the issues raised in the television forum, which was shown Saturday and yesterday on the Pittsburgh Cable News Channel, WPXI-TV in Pittsburgh and on the statewide Pennsylvania Cable Network.

In cases where a drunken driver has killed someone or in child abuse cases, "they should know right from the outset what the sentence is going to be," Barrassé said.

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
