# Physical play suits Mack just fine

INDIANAPOLIS -- Kim Calhoun crossed midcourt and set herself. She folded her arms across her chest, planted her feet and stood firm. Tiffany Glosson never knew what hit her.

The Ohio State center, with her head turned in the ball's direction elsewhere, ran directly into Calhoun as Penn State broke the Buckeve press. Glosson laid on the court for several minutes. Play was stopped, and the sophomore would not return.
