"I'm not sure if I'm awake yet," Dunn said. "I say that with all sincerity. I've tried not to think about what's happened yet and I'm not going to change anything. Sometime in April I'll sit back and reflect on all the good things that have happened to myself and the players and this University."

The Lions gathered in the Founder's Lounge of the Jordan Center to watch the selection show, and when the matchup with the Razorbacks was announced, there

was no eruption from the assembled crowd.

Forward Phil Williams attributed the subdued reaction to the relative lack of drama. Unlike in years past, there was no question the Lions would be included among tournament teams.

"I think everybody knew we were there, it was just a question of waiting to see who we'd play," Williams explained. "It wasn't like we were on the bubble or anything."

Citing an invitation to the tournament as a primary goal for the 1995-96 season, this objective has been realized.

After narrowly missing last year, pundits may expect Penn State to

be content with simply making the Big Dance. Guard Dan Earl is confident this will not occur.

"I've always said that after making the tournament, once you're in it, anything can happen," Earl said. "I think we'll readjust now that we are in and we're all very excited."

After being picked by many to finish near the bottom of the Big Ten heap, Penn State competed for conference supremacy throughout the campaign.

From the beginning, Dunn convinced his team not to pay attention to naysayers.

And the performance on the court was good enough to grab a coveted NCAA berth. Now, the second season begins.

Schneider, 54, suffered severe wounds to the head and face.

Schneider's home was picked by the intruders at random, according to a Ferguson Township Police Department news release.

Upon returning to her home, Schneider surprised the youth and was attacked shortly after, according to the news release.

The youth will be charged with criminal attempt homicide, aggravated assault, criminal conspiracy, burglary, robbery, criminal trespass, theft, receiving

stolen property and simple assault, according to a news release. The minor was arrested Friday night in Altoona's Mill Run area after police received a tip, and at least one additional arrest is expected, according to the news release.

A preliminary intake hearing will be held today at the Centre County Courthouse, Gricar said.

"If he is tried as a juvenile there will be attempts made at rehabilitating him," Sullivan said. If tried as an adult, the suspect could receive 50 to 100 years in prison if he received the maximum sentence on all charges, Gricar said.




