Continued from Page 8. before they cooled off in the Oregon heat.

"I know this isn't a PGA Tour event and I know it's not an individual event, but I know it's an event we've taken seriously the past few years and we want to do that again," Faxon said.

Norman had eight birdies on a day when he said he really didn't want to play.

"This is my 31st consecutive day of playing golf. My 32nd day will be Tuesday. That's a lot of golf for me. I didn't feel like playing today. I'm glad I've got a partner," he

said. "At the International (last weekend) I didn't even care if I made it to Sunday or not. I hate that and I'm not going to let myself get in that situation again."

The few times Norman had a bad shot, Faxon was there to save par.

Fred Couples and John Cook were alone in second at 9-under 62. Cook won the tournament with Mark O'Meara in 1994, the last time someone besides Norman and Faxon won. Cook had six birdies, including a run from the 12th to 15th holes.

"We're good friends and we've never played in anything like this,"

Couples said. "After today, I'll take him as a partner anytime."

Couples, who missed the Challenge for the first time last year, said he's far from top form.

"I just haven't played any golf," he said. "I just kind of felt like not playing for a while. Now I'm trying to play but there's not really anything to play for. So I'm just hanging in there and playing once in a while."

The previous record of 61 was set by Faxon and Rick Fehr in 1991 and tied last year by Faxon-Norman and Cook-Mark O'Meara.

The crowd's favorite team, Arnold Palmer and tournament host Peter Jacobsen, were three shots back at 63. The 67-year-old Palmer has played in all 12 Fred Meyer events and has been Jacobsen's partner for the last 11, but he has never won it.

"I made a couple of birdies and Peter made a bunch," said Palmer, who says he's regained 90 percent of his strength six months after undergoing successful surgery for prostate cancer.

"I don't swing quite as fast the last few holes as I did on the first ones, let's put it that way," Palmer said.

Steve Elkington and Craig Stadler also were at 63, despite a bogey on the par-4, 460-yard 6th hole.

Bogeys are rare in a best-ball format, when the player with the lowest score on a hole has that score recorded for his team.

The 24 golfers in the event, considered the biggest unofficial stop on the PGA Tour.

"We run tournaments, too, but to get Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus in the same field for two days and a pro-am, that speaks for itself," Billy Andrade said.

# Moments in the sports world

**Babe hits three**  
ST. LOUIS (AP) - Babe Ruth once hit a home run off two pitches. It happened in the 1928 World Series between the New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals.

Ruth hit a home run in the fourth inning of the fourth game and came up again in the seventh.

The pitcher was Willie Sherdel. With two strikes on the Babe, Sherdel tried to quick-pitch him and sneaked one down the middle when the Babe was not looking. It would have been strike three, but the umpire ruled it an illegal quick pitch and said it didn't count.

Sherdel came in with another pitch and this time the Babe was looking. He hit high and far to right field for a home run.

Ruth hit another homer in the eighth inning, his third of the game.

**Namath predicts**  
MIAMI (AP) - Joe Namath of the New York Jets - a great quarterback - was at his best in the 1969 Super Bowl between the Jets and Baltimore Colts.

Although the Jets were a 19-point underdog, Namath guaranteed a victory. And he delivered. The Jets won the game, 16-7. Namath won MVP honors for the game by completing 17 of 28 passes for 206 yards.

**Overcame injury**  
MIAMI (AP) - Few professional golfers had to play with the physical handicaps that Ed Furgol did.

Furgol, who died earlier this

year at the age of 79, shattered his left elbow in a childhood accident. It left him with a crooked and shortened left arm.

Furgol overcame his handicap so well that he won five PGA Tour titles. In 1954, he won the U.S. Open, defeating the talented Gene Littler by one stroke.

**Contacts better**  
PONTE VISTA, Fla. (AP) - In the case of pro golfer Paul Stankowski, you could say the "eyes" have it.

For most of his career he was among the less talented putters on the tour. He was wearing glasses and said he had trouble lining up a 10-foot putt.

But when he switched to contact lenses in 1996, his putting showed dramatic improvement.

"The contacts made the hole look bigger," he said, "and I could see every blade of grass on the green."

**Gift to Brown**  
PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) - A Brown University trustee, Elizabeth Chace, and her husband, Malcolm G. Chace III, announced that their gift of \$1.4 million to the school was in honor of star player, Liz Turner.

The money will go to endow the head coach of the women's basketball team. Elizabeth Chace is the president of the Friends of Brown Women's Basketball.

**Long-range fan**  
INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - If there is an award to go to a long-distance basketball fan each year, it should go to Mitsuhiro Hirota of Japan.

He traveled from Tokyo to witness the Final Four here in March and saw Arizona take home the big prize.

In the past, he has journeyed from Japan to take in one game, the NBA All-Star game. And he also went from Indianapolis, then his home, three times last summer to see Olympic basketball.

**Fans vote**  
NEW YORK (AP) - The most democratic of all the professional all-star teams appears to be the one picked for the NFL Pro Bowl game in Honolulu.

The fans, coaches and players vote for the teams, in terms of equal importance. The 42-man squads, representing the NFC and the AFC, have 21 offensive players, 17 defensive and four specialists.

A 43rd man will be chosen on a "need" basis and must be a line-backer or defensive end.

**Olympic renewals**  
ATHENS, Greece (AP) - The Olympic Games are held every four years, unless a world war interferes, but there was one exception.

The modern games began in 1896 and there were Olympics in 1900 and 1904. Then, in 1906, games were held in Athens, celebrating the 10th anniversary of the modern Olympics.

The International Olympic Committee sanctioned the games, and 20 nations sent 884 competitors.

The individual star was middle-distance runner Paul Pilgrim of the United States, who won the 400 meters and the 800 meters.
