#### Thornton signs with **Boston for three years**

BOSTON (AP) - The Boston Bruins have reached an agreement with Joe Thornton, the first player chosen in the NHL amateur draft in June, on a three-year contract, the team announced yesterday.

Thornton, 18, was expected to be in Boston by the end of the week to officially sign the contract. Terms were not disclosed.

'Ouite obviously, we're thrilled that this process has ended with this agreement," Bruins assistant general manager Mike O'Connell said.

"He's big, strong and has all of the skills you look for in a player, with the attitude to match."

Thornton is seen as a vital cog in the Bruins' rebuilding effort. The team finished with the worst record in the league last season, and missed the playoffs for the first time in 30 years.

The 6-foot-4 center had 41 goals and 81 assists for the Sault St. Marie Grevhounds of the Ontario Hockey League last season.

He was the youngest member of the 1997 gold-medal winning Canadian World Junior team.
