Buckeyes' offense having bad day(s)

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Ohio State's offense is playing as if it's wading through three feet of mud on every play.

The line is barely slowing down onrushing defenders, the running game has vanished, there's no time to get a pass to the receivers and quarterback Steve Bellisari has spent more time laying on the ground than standing on his feet. On top of that, many fans are critical of the coaches' play-calling.

Why is the Ohio State offense so

"Everyone is a little frustrated right now, knowing that we're a better team than the way we're playing," fullback Matt Keller said. "We truly believe that."

Having lost two of their last three games heading into Saturday's showdown at No. 24 Minnesota, the No. 22 Buckeyes have to find some answers and find them

Head coach John Cooper, offensive coordinator Mike Jacobs and quarterbacks coach Tim Salem all said the same phrase about what is holding the Buckeyes back: "It's a combination of things.'

The line gave up eight sacks at Penn State as the offense mustered just three points in last week's 23-10 loss. The unit never drove inside the Penn State 29 the entire game. The only touchdown came on Gary Berry's fumble recovery in the end

"Sometimes we didn't block the right guy," Cooper said. "Sometimes we blocked the right guy and got whipped.'

Minnesota, by the way, leads the Rig Ten in sacks.

'I'm sure after looking at our films they'll blitz even more," Cooper said. "They'll bring the kitchen sink against us.

Jacobs said there isn't much linemen aren't missing many rushing in three consecutive said assignments and they aren't making a lot of mistakes. He said the Penn State's defense.

and pretty much on line up until last weekend," he said. "That doesn't mean we've had a problem through the first five ballgames or six ballgames. We had a problem last weekend.'

Is it the running backs?

In the Buckeyes' two most recent losses, tailback Michael Wiley has totaled 54 yards on 19 carries, an average of 2.8 yards per try. Backups Jonathan Wells and Jerry Westbrooks have combined for a net of two yards on eight attempts in those same two defeats.

There haven't been many big holes, but the backs haven't shown a knack for making any big plays

"Right now, we're just making a lot of mistakes," said Jamar Martin, who has taken over for Keller at fullback while an ankle injury mends. "Some of the things we go over in practice we miscue in the game. There are a few things that we don't see that we mess up on. Sometimes it might be the pressure some guys are feeling.'

Is Bellisari running scared instead of running the offense?

The sophomore has excited a lot of Ohio State fans with his tough demeanor and fiery personality. But he is also making a lot of mistakes.

"Quarterbacks don't have the luxury of being good one play and bad the next," Salem said. "They have to be good every play. That's one thing that's slowing us down some on offense. ... I want to see more consistency than one great, great play and then five bad ones."

Ohio State has suffered 22 sacks so far, which would make any quarterback gunshy. But Bellisari has shown little

Ratliff out with injury in Sixers' preseason

PHILADELPHIA — Philadelphia 76ers power forward Theo Ratliff is out at least three weeks with a stress fracture in his left leg after taking a nasty tumble in a preseason game last week. The announcement came Monday night.

Ratliff, who got tangled up with Charlie Ward of the Knicks as both fell out of bounds last Tuesday, had the foot immobilized in a boot Monday after an MRI revealed the stress fracture in his tibia. Ratliff said the injury "definitely" happened on that play.

The Sixers, who entertained a half-filled First Union Center with a scrimmage Monday night, brought in newly-signed free-agent center Stanley Roberts for a workout, general manager Billy King

"I know this is something you have to deal with at times," said Ratliff, who was hobbled by a thigh bruise in the playoffs last season and sat out the fourth and final game of the second-round series against Indiana.

"I've been injured before," he

said, "but never to this extent." The Sixers already are hindered by a rash of injuries. Matt Geiger sat out Monday night with a sore left knee, and Tyrone Hill was out with a fractured left thumb. Allen Iverson played with a sore knee, scoring 15 points including 10 of his team's 16 in the first half of the

20-minute scrimmage. Iverson's team beat a squad featuring only two regulars, Larry Hughes and Aaron McKie, 37-36. Iverson's team included starters Eric Snow and George Lynch, Rowan Barrett and rookies Jumaine Jones and Todd MacCulloch.

MacCulloch, a 7-footer and second-round draft choice, was impressive again with six points and three blocks. But coach Larry Brown wants to add a veteran center, especially with Ratliff out.

Brown watched the scrimmage with King and team president Pat Croce while assistants John Calipari and Randy Ayers handled the coaching.


