






Hacker tampers with weather Web site

Sometime between 9:30 and 11 p.m. Wednesday, an unknown person changed the weather forecast on the Campus Weather Service's Web site (www.meteo.psu.edu/cws/), according to CWS Vice President Matt Cerrato.

Yesterday and today's weather forecasts were replaced with inappropriate sexual innuendoes. The Web site was last updated at 10:54 p.m. Wednesday.

The only computer with access to editing the Web site is centrally located inside the weather station, Cerrato said.

For security purposes, CWS has discussed installing a card access system to the room with the Department of Meteorology, said CWS President Michael Kidonakis.

CWS is not sure of what happened, but an internal investigation is under way and disciplinary action will be taken when the person responsible is found, Cerrato said.

"We are continuing to investigate," Kidonakis said. "If and when we find the person who is responsible, we intend to turn the person over to 'university security.'
