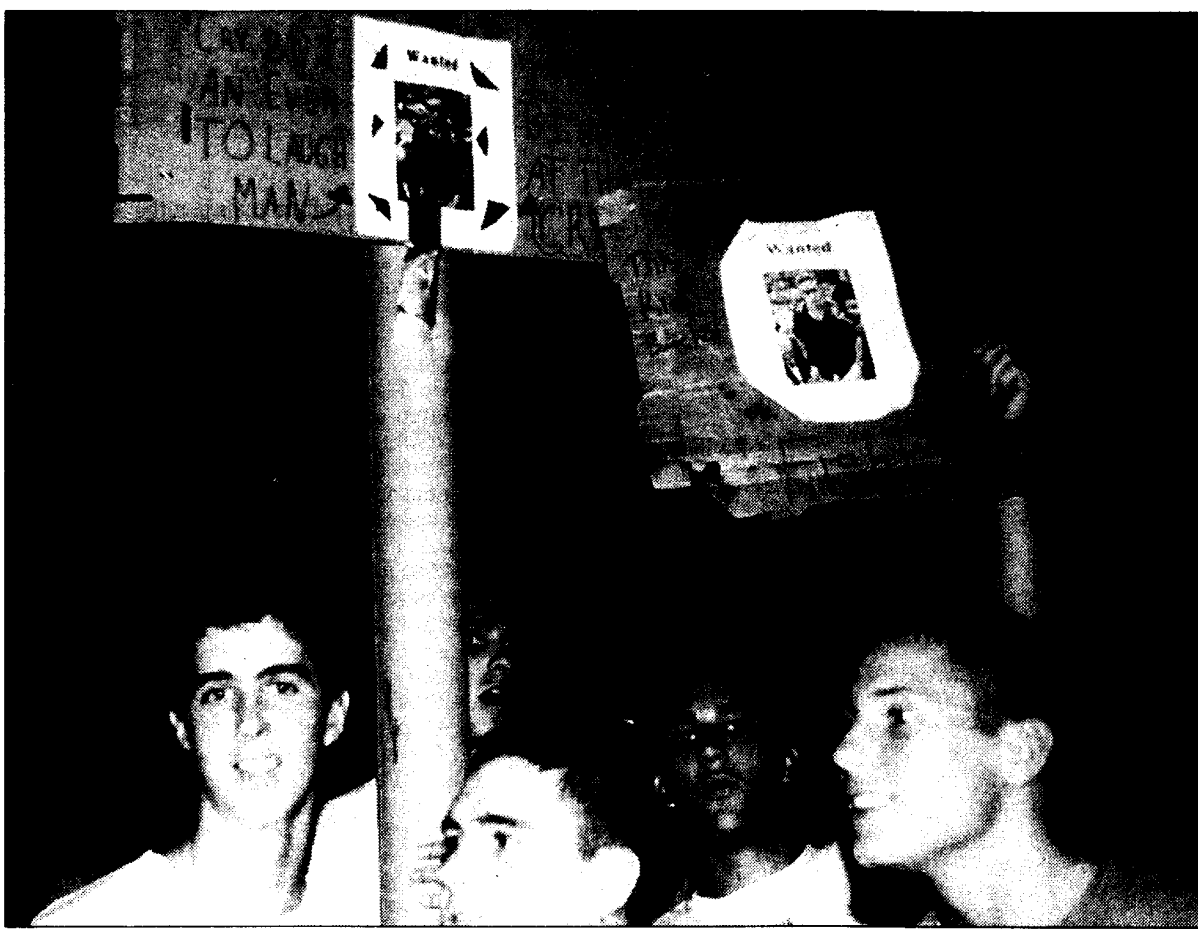

Men's golf team places second in Wisconsin

The Penn State men's golf team placed second in Wisconsin's Badger Invitational held this past weekend. The Badgers won the tournament held at University Ridge, their home course, with a collegiate course record score of 860. The Nittany Lions finished the two-day event four strokes away from the Badgers and 11 strokes ahead of third-place finisher Toledo. Nittany Lion red-shirt senior Matt Abbott placed fourth overall shooting two under par for a total score of 214. Red-shirt juniors Andy Latowski and Jim Fuller tied for fifth place overall each posting scores of 1 under par (215). Red-shirt senior Jeff Turton finished the event with a score of 223 and tied for 30th overall while junior Josh Dawes tied for 43rd with a score of 227. The Nittany Lions next compete in Fort Collins, Colo. in Colorado State's Ram Invitational on Sept. 25-26.

Back injury puts Broncos' K Elam in hospital

DENVER — Denver Broncos kicker Jason Elam was taken to the hospital Sunday after injuring his lower back while trying to make a tackle against the Atlanta Falcons. Elam, who shares the NFL record with a 63-yard field goal, had to be helped from the field after safety Johndale Carty sent him flying with a hard block along the sidelines late the second quarter. The hit occurred as Elam was chasing Darrick Vaughn during his 100-yard kickoff return. Elam lay on the ground for several minutes and was unable to put any weight on his dangling right leg as he was taken to the sideline. Elam was admitted to the hospital and was listed in serious but stable condition at Swedish Medical Center late Sunday, said a nursing supervisor who declined to give her name.

Good weather expected for opening ceremony

SYDNEY, Australia — Weather officials predict fine conditions for Friday's opening ceremony of the Sydney Olympics. On Friday, Sydney can expect "fine, and cool to mild conditions," with "light to moderate southwest winds," Kevin O'Loughlin, acting regional director for New South Wales state at the Bureau of Meteorology, said Monday. Temperatures on Friday will range between 51 degrees in the morning and 69.8 degrees in the afternoon, O'Loughlin said. It was the bureau's first official weather forecast for the Olympic Games period. Weather officials will issue four-day forecasts along with "an additional, three-day trend." Separately, the bureau will be testing new technology during the games that could enable scientists to forecast the weather one to six hours ahead: as part of an international research project.

Flyers, LeClair talks stall; continue into night

VOORHEES, N.J. — The Philadelphia Flyers said talks aimed at reaching a multi-year contract with left wing John LeClair would continue past a Monday midnight deadline LeClair had set earlier. Flyers general manager Bob Clarke said he and LeClair's agent, Lewis Gross, agreed to continue negotiations. "We're very disappointed that we have been unable to reach an agreement with John," Clarke said at an afternoon press conference. "We made what we believe is an outstanding offer, one that would rank John as one of the top five highest paid players in the NHL." Clarke said the two sides agreed on the term of the contract (four years), but the amount of money was still a point of contention. LeClair said he did not want the deadline to stand in the way of an agreement.
