## JoePa to meet with doctors

Joe Paterno said he plans to meet

with doctors today to discuss the health of his injured right leg and hip. While he said he has not given any thought about having surgery,

Paterno said Tuesday if that's what the doctors recommend, he would want to get it done as soon as possible after the season.

"I think I'm going to have to get something done," Paterno said dur-

ing his weekly press conference Tuesday. "I want to find out from them what they think has to be done and get it done as soon as I can after and Penn State President Graham the season so I can get on the road and go out and recruit."

When asked if that meant Paterno plans to return to coaching for the 2009 season, the 81-year-old coach paused before offering his answer. "Have I ever said I wasn't coming

back?" Paterno said.

Paterno's contract with the university expires at the end of this season at his situation.

Spanier and Athletic Director Tim Curley said they will wait until after the season to discuss Paterno's future.

Paterno said with the Nittany Lions off this week, he will use the time to have his right leg and hip examined by team doctors.

He said he hasn't given the doctors a chance to get a "professional look"

"It's not one of those things that has to be done but I'm uncomfortable, that's obvious, but it's fixable,' Paterno said. "And if I understand it, and I don't want to put words into the doctors' mouths, but they don't think it's something that's going to keep me out for a long time.'

### Paterno, officials address disturbance

Joe Paterno called the disruptions that took place downtown Saturday after his team's win over Ohio State "disappointing," and said he may speak to students in the future to curb any potential incidents.

### Paranormal researcher searches for campus spirits

More than 600,000 students have graduated from Penn State in the past 150 years. Who's to say a few ghosts haven't stuck around?

With more than 700 buildings on campus, some of them more than 100 years old, they'd certainly have space to hide. And with the amount of history this campus has seen, they'd probably have plenty to hide from.

Finding where these spirits lurk is easy enough, Eilfie Music said - it's figuring out why they're still banging around that's tough. A seven-year veteran of the Paranormal Research Society, she researches the history behind reports of haunting, seeking an answer for a phenomena some consider unanswerable.

Enrollment at all 24 university campuses and the World Campus reached an all-time high this semester, according to a press release issued Monday.

University-wide enrollment numbers increased from 90,609 to 92,613 in the past year. About 1,000 of the newly enrolled students are studying exclusively online at the World Campus, said university spokeswoman Annemarie Mountz.

University Park enrollment increased from 42,083 students to 43,272. The numbers don't include students enrolled in the Dickinson School of Law and students studying abroad or participating in coops and internships, Mountz said.

The university tries to cap admissions numbers between 42,000 and 43,000 at University Park, she added.

"It has to do with the size of the campus, the facilities and what the environment can hold," Mountz said.

The increased enrollment numbers reflect the record-high entering class of about 7,300 students in 2006, Robert Pangborn, vice president and dean for Undergraduate Education, said in the release. He added the high enrollment numbers of that class will continue to affect the total until the class graduates.


