UPUA reviews future agenda

Student leaders hope their Sunday afternoon "gameplan" meeting will lend a variety of University Park Undergraduate Association (UPUA) initiatives some increased momentum.

UPUA President Gavin Keirans said he's hoping to turn a lot of the semester's conversations into action. UPUA needs to of its proposed initiatives, Keirans said.

Medical amnesty is one of the initiatives discussed Sunday that Keirans said he hopes to see come to fruition by next semester. He called it a common-sense safety measure he wants to move along as soon as possible.

UPUA Director of University Relations Chris Smith said he has recently been in meetings with officials from the State College Borough and the university to have a medical amnesty policy implemented.

In all the talks that have taken place, Chris Smith (senior-political science) said he did not anticipate any roadblocks that would being put in place.

"I'm excited to try and get things moving before next semester,"Chris Smith said.

"Everyone loves Thanksgiving food," Ryan (senior-history) said.






