egan Hodge is no stranger to recognition.

The senior on the Penn State women's volleyball team was named AVCA National Player of the Year, the top women's volleyball athlete and Female Athlete of the Year this past season

In her four-year career at Penn State, Hodge recorded 2,142 kills and had a hitting percentage of .371 in her senior season.

The outside hitter was the face of Nittany Lion volleyball, and her accomplishments are undeniable.

"I think she had an exceptional year and career, and that obviously didn't go unnoticed," Penn State coach Russ Rose said. "It was about as good of a year as anyone could possibly have. Yet, she's managed to keep her head on straight

through all of it."

After the team's third straight national championship, Hodge was offered a hefty salary to go play in California for the U.S. National Team. However, the senior elected to remain in school for her final semester so she could earn her degree.

While Rose said he will remain an "interested fan" while Hodge continues her career, he and the rest of the team realize they are losing a key contributor.

"Megan is a huge impact to this team," junior defensive specialist Cathy Quilico said. "She's a really good athlete and an even greater friend. She just makes you better at everything you do because she sets such high standards for herself and for this team. It's gonna be different without her."



NO. 2 ALISHA GLASS

NO. 3 JARED ODRICK

The highlight for Jared Odrick came Thursday night, when the Miami Dolphins selected the former Penn State defensive tackle with the No. 28 pick in the NFL Draft. But Odrick has been in the spotlight all season long — not exactly common for an interior lineman. Despite being double-teamed all year, Odrick recorded seven sacks and 11 tackles for loss, earning him the coaches' selection as the Big Ten's defensive player of the year. The honor was the first for an interior linemen since 1993.

The closer it gets to graduation, the more Hodge and her teammates realize what is going to be lost. Quilico joked that she isn't going to have any more nicknames, such as "The Widget," since Hodge was the one who created all of them.

Hodge added that while she feels she has "tapped out" her college life and is excited to start a new part of her career, she is sad to leave her Penn State family behind.

"It gets harder and harder just because I notice more that I will be leaving soon," Hodge said. "I haven't gotten a chance to see the girls as much as I'd like to, and I miss them so much already. I'm leaving 14 sisters behind, so it's definitely sad."

The senior will move to California after graduation with teammate Alisha Glass, who was also selected to play for the national team and to whom Hodge contributes a lot of her collegiate success.

Rose said it will be hard for next year's team to step up to the efforts of Hodge and the rest of the seniors and added that the outside hitter will be missed in every way possible.

"She's a great talent," Rose said. "She improved while she was at Penn State. I take great pride in the person she is and don't take credit for who she became while she was here. She was willing to do all the necessary things and knew it wasn't always about her but about the team."

Hodge points to the team's 2009-10 national championship as the most meaningful award of her career. However, while Quilico said her teammate deserves every individual award that is handed to her, Hodge wouldn't be fazed either way.

"I don't play for stuff like that," Hodge said. "At the end of the day it's about this team, I'm not trying to take away from that. I wouldn't have gotten any of these awards without them. These awards are about me, but really they're about everyone who got me to where I am today."

With just two wins all season, it's hard to believe Glenn Thiel's squad is still alive. But with one game left on its schedule against Delaware on Friday night, the Penn State men's lacrosse team is in contention for the Colonial Athletic Association postseason tournament and controls its own destiny.

The 2010 season has seen an inconsistent Penn State team that has struggled to put together back-to-back solid performances. The Lions have one remaining game on Saturday against Temple before the ALC Tournament in Columbus. Penn State looks to play well enough to earn an elusive bid to the NCAA tournament.

The Penn State men's tennis team will compete in the Big Ten tennis tournament this weekend. The Lions (15-10, 3-7) likely need to win the confrence tournament to make the NCAA tournament. Penn State finished eighth in the Big Ten and play top seed Ohio State, who is No. 2 in the nation on Friday if they win Thursday.
