Local store holds Christmas sale

"The growing awareness of Alzheimer keeps getting larger, and we need to find a cure," she said. "One year we participated in Relay for Life, but since we do have a dementia unit we see that it affects a lot of our residents."

Phoebe Watson, who participated in last year's event, said she will also sell Longaberger items at this year's sale.

"I like doing events where there is a donation — anything for a good cause," Watson said. "I thought it was really nice. The residents were involved — it's different than any other event I've been to."
