Reds shut out Pirates

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Reds rookie Travis Wood shut out the Pirates on two singles over seven innings, fill-in first baseman Miguel Cairo drove in two runs and the Cincinnati Reds stayed hot, beating the Pittsburgh Cincinnati Pirates 4-0 on Monday night. Russ Springer,

the 41-year-old right-hander brought up from the minors earlier

in the day, and Arthur Rhodes, the 40-year-old first-time All-Star, pitched an inning each to complete the combined three-hitter -Cincinnati's seventh shutout and fifth victory in six games.


