Personalize The Job Search

Take a look at a typical iob search scenario in a competitive job market: You've recently sent your resume to an organization that advertised an opening. You're excited about this opportunity because it seems perfect for you. You have relevant skills and experience and have spent days presenting these on vour resume and cover letter. You know you could be successful in this position. So you wait anxiously with much optimism.

Meanwhile, the recruiter

is sitting in her office with over 100 pieces of cottonbond paper (resumes), each having only subtle differences in color, style, and typed content. With this large number of resumes, she executes a quick, 20second scan of each resume to dwindle down the The months and stack. vears of acquiring relevant knowledge and practical experience through courses, full-time and part-time jobs, extracurricular activities and internships, along with the hours spent producing your resume, results in a 20second scan of your piece of cotton-bond paper.

Was this a thorough examination of your potential? Did the recruiter get a chance to explore your skills and experience and learn about your ambition and excitement for this job? Did they really get to know the person behind that piece of paper?

The job search process is impersonal by nature. Think about it. The recruiter's first impression or assessment of you is usually based on the words on a fancy piece of paper. Your resume and cover letter are being analyzed - not your enthusiasm, communication skills, positive attitude, self-confidence, interpersonal skills, or sense of humor. You must create situations where vou, the whole person, are assessed and evaluated.

Networking is the key to putting a face to your resume, providing you the ultimate way to present yourself as the ideal candidate.

Social networking sites, such as Facebook and Twitter, are networks that you

already have established with personal contacts. When you are looking for a job, post about it. You never know who may see your status update or tweet and know someone, who knows someone, who is hiring.

Another avenue to explore is professional networking. Like social networks, professional networks allow you to connect with others and help you gather needed information on majors, career options, or a particular company
