

Steelers suffer first loss, McNabb trumps old team

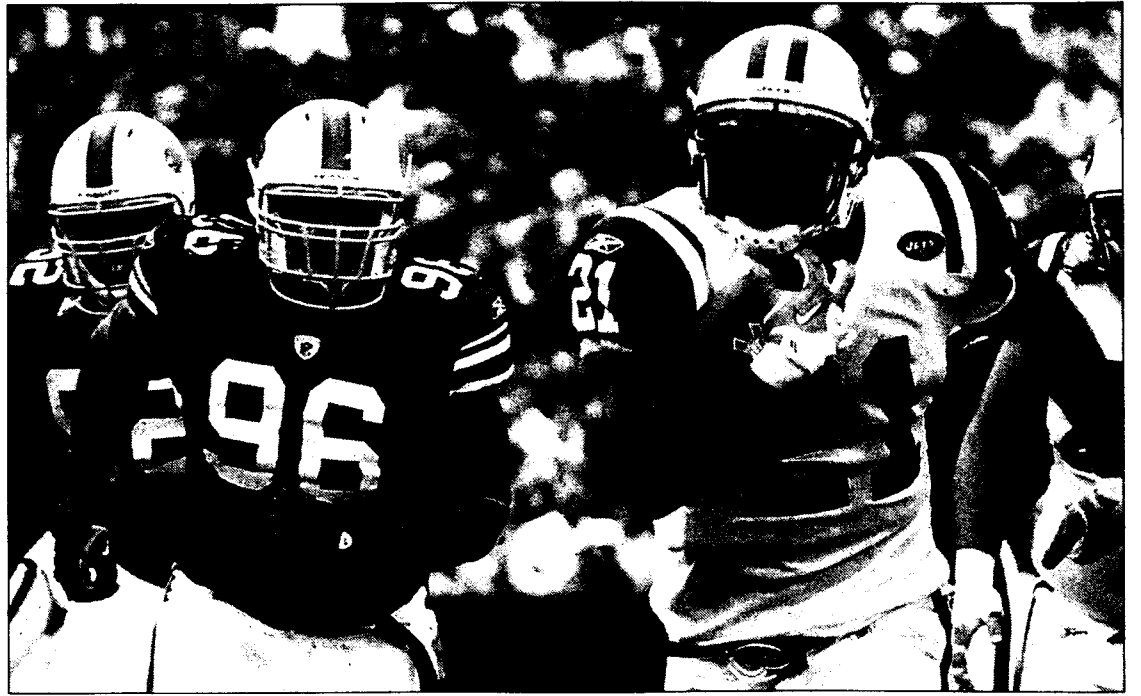

Green Bay 28, Detroit 26

New York Jets 38, Buffalo 14

LaDainian Tomlinson had his best game in nearly two years, rushing for 133 yards and two touchdowns, and Dustin Keller had two TD catches to lead the Jets (3-1) to a 38-14 victory over the Bills (0-4).

Charles Woodson returned an interception 48 yards for a touchdown and the Packers (3-1) narrowly held off a comeback by the Lions (0-4) for a 28-26 victory. Aaron Rodgers threw for 181 yards with three touchdowns but also threw a pair of interceptions in the win.

Cleveland 23, Cincinnati 20

Peyton Hillis rumbled for 102 yards and a touchdown, Phil Dawson kicked three field goals and the Browns (1-3) held on to a fourth-quarter lead, surviving a big day by Terrell Owens for their first win, 23-20 over the Bengals (2-2).

Atlanta 16, San Francisco 14

Matt Bryant kicked a 42-yarder with 2 seconds to go in lifting the fortunate Falcons (3-1) to a 16-14 victory over the 49ers (0-4), who blew a 14-0 first-quarter lead due in part to a pair of interceptions by Alex Smith.

New Orleans 16, Carolina 14

Only days after rejoining the Saints at age 46, John Carney hit three field goals to help the Saints (3-1) edge the Panthers (0-4) 16-14. The Saints signed Carney on Tuesday, after Garrett Hartley had missed a 29-yard field goal in overtime in a loss to Atlanta last Sunday.

Baltimore 17, Pittsburgh 14

Joe Flacco withstood the Steelers' goal-line stand and go-ahead touchdown in the closing minutes to throw an 18-yard scoring pass to T.J. Houshmandzadeh with 32 seconds remaining, and the Ravens (3-1) beat the Steelers (3-1) 17-14.

Denver 26, Tennessee 20

Kyle Orton threw a 6-yard touchdown pass to Correll Buckhalter with 1:33 left, and the Broncos (2-2) rallied and beat the Titans (2-2) 26-20. Orton finished with 341 yards passing and touchdowns to both Eddie Royal and Correll Buckhalter.

St. Louis 20, Seattle 3

The Rams (2-2) won consecutive games for the first time in two seasons by beating the Seahawks (2-2) 20-3. Sam Bradford completed 23 of 41 passes with one interception as the Rams ended a 10-game losing streak against Seattle.

Jacksonville 31, Indianapolis 28

Josh Scobee's 59-yard field goal on the final play gave the Jaguars a 31-28 victory over the Colts. The Jaguars (2-2) rebounded from consecutive lopsided losses and handed the Colts (2-2) their second division loss.

Houston 31, Oakland 24

Arian Foster scored on a 74-yard run and Troy Nolan's second interception sealed the Texans' (3-

1) 31-24 victory over the Raiders (1-3). Foster was held out until midway through the second quarter in what the Texans said was a "coach's decision."

Washington 17, Philadelphia 12

Donovan McNabb threw for 125 yards and one touchdown in leading the Redskins (2-2) to a 17-12 victory over the Eagles (2-2) in his first game against his former team. The Eagles' Michael Vick was injured in the first quarter.

San Diego 41, Arizona 10

Antonio Gates became the seventh tight end in NFL history with 500 catches, and had 144 yards and two touchdowns as the Chargers (2-2) beat the Cardinals (2-2). Rookie Ryan Mathews scored his first NFL touchdown.

New York Giants 17, Chicago 3

The Giants (2-2) sacked Jay Cutler nine times in the first half and held the Bears (3-1) to 110 yards in the Giants' 17-3 win, leaving the NFC with no unbeaten.
