

options but will also include things like a pizza and pasta bar to replace Rigatony's, Asian cuisine, vegetarian options and a bakery café area.

The university has also selected an architect from Seattle, Wash. to help with the interior design process, Wandel said.

She said Simmons employees will be given an opportunity to work in the other dining commons, so no jobs will be lost.

Simmons RA Tiffany Wallace organized the event in an effort to keep students informed about the changes that Pollock will undergo as well as the reasons behind

"My goal is really to promote aware-Wallace (senior-mathematics) said. ness." "I've found that first-year students especially are really attached to the commons. I think it's important to let them know what's going on and why."

Some students at the presentation questioned whether or not Pollock would be able to handle the influx of students who usually ate at Simmons, but Wandel said that it would not be an issue.

"We're hoping to make Pollock so attractive that students who are used to the convenience of Simmons won't mind walking the extra block to get there, she said.

She stressed that the plans regarding changes to Pollock are preliminary and have yet to be approved by the Board of Trustees, but the plans will be finalized in mid-November. At that time, blueprints will also be available for students who are curious as to what the new Pollock will look like. But regardless of the changes being planned for Pollock, some students said they are still sad to see Simmons go.

"It's sad because I enjoy Simmons, and dining options on campus," said Haley Kragness (sophomore-division of undergraduate studies). "But I do see why the changes are necessary. 
