## Lions face Northwestern Team looking to build off win By Ryan Loy

In the Big Ten coaches' preseason poll. Northwestern was nowhere to be found on the list of favorites to win the conference.

Meanwhile. WOMEN'S Penn State sat VOLLEYBALL atop the list of programs predicted to claim the Big Ten title.

Now, the No. 9 Nittany Lions (16-4, 6-3 Big Ten) are sitting just one spot above the Wildcats (15-4, 5-3).

Northwestern is trying to do something it hasn't done in 22 years - finish the season with a winning conference record. Since 1988, the Wildcats haven't been able to surpass 10 Big Ten victories in any one season, and they ve finished in last place six times.

The Wildcats' success has caught the attention of the conference, and Lions coach Russ Rose knows his team will face a tough challenge when Penn State takes on the Wildcats at 8 p.m. Saturday in Evanston, Ill.



Defending nationl champion Duke will begin the 2010-11 men's college basketball season as the No. 1 team in the country.

The Blue Devils were voted the top team in the ESPN/USA Today preseason coaches poll, receiving 29 of 31 first-place votes. Rounding out the top five were Michigan State, Kansas State, Pittsburgh and Ohio State

The Big Ten is well represented in the poll with five teams in the top 25. Purdue. Illinois and Wisconsin join the Spartans and the Buckeyes as the Big Ten's representatives

In all, nine teams that finished last season unranked cracked the top 25.
