Germany Expected to Make Restitution for Owners of Frye

Voluntary Offer for Remuneration and Apology for Destroying American Ship Would Be Pro per Amends to Government

Washington, March 11-Unless the German government voluntarily offers to make restitution for the destruction of the American ship Frye, sunk by the converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich in the south Atlantic, and expresses regret for the occurrence, strong protest will be made by the United States with a request for reparation.

Captured Crews Discharged.

It was made clear at the state department that whatever action ould be taken as the result of the sinking of the Frye would be entirely disassociated from questions arising out of the entry into an American port of the Prinz Eitel desiring time for repairs. The vessel could, therefore, depart, leaving the question raised by the destruction of the American ship to be settled through diplomatic channels.

Capt. Boy-Ed, naval attache of German embassy, it was understood here, has gone to Newport News from New York, to confer with the captain of the Prinz Eitel, and obtain a sworn statement of the facts for the German government.

Capt. Kishne of the Frye has been asked to keep the members of his crew together, so that all the testimony necessary for diplomatic correspondence may be gathered. The captain probably will come to Washington Saturday to confer with treasury and state department and give a personal statement of the circumstances surrounding the sinking of his ship.

Maritime Rules Violated.

Examination of the precedents in international law revealed to state department officials that irrespective of the provisions of the Declaration of London, the status of which is uncertain because it was not generally ratified, the general rules of maritime practice have prohibited the destruction of a neutral vessel under the circumstances in which the Frye was found in the south Atlantic by the Prinz Eitel.
