

## Thinks Prospects Bright

WASHIGTON, Sept. 2. - Cardinal Gibbons, dean of the college of cardinals, presented to President Wilson today a confidential communication from Pope Benedict inviting and urgin this Government to co-operate with the Vatican and neutral nations to bring about peace in Europe.

A conference on the same subject was held later at the state department between Cardinal Gibbons and Secretary of State Lansing. After his visit and confidential talk to and with the President, Cardinai Gibbons said:

"I think the prospects for peace are brightening."

This statement, expressing the judgment of a rapresentative of the pope after conferring with President Wilson, is regarded here as indicating that definitive results so far as future action by this Government and the Vatican are concerned, already are being realized.
