Vienna Reports French Have Landed New Army of 150,000 Men in Salonica, Greece.

LONDON, Oct. 28,-A Bucharest dispatch says the Russians have begun an attack on the Black sea coast of Bulgaria.

"A Russian fleet arrived at four o'clock this morning off the Bulgarian coast," the correspondent wires, "and immediately began a bombardment of Varna. Shelling was still proceeding at 11 o'clock. Considerable damage has been done to the town."
