News of All Kinds Gathered From Various Points Throughout the Keystone State.

Welsh mountain fires have destroyed vast timber tracts.

Robert W. Roth, an invalid, shot himself and died at Bath.

A six-foot black snake was killed along Goose Run, near Pottstown.

Counterfeit nickels and dimes are circulating in the Hazleton region.

Run over by a farm team, John Levan, Grovania, may not recover.

Struck by a train at Carlisle, William Waggoner was possibly fatally injured.

In ill health, Farmer Fred Tippitt hanged himself at Russell, Warren county.

For some time a thief in West Chester has been robbing dogs of their collars.

Seventy automobilists have been fined in Hazleton for running cars without lights.

Quarry workmen near Lewistown dug up a cluster of snakes about the size of a football.

A forest fire burned over 700 acres of woodland at Lily Lake and Pond Hill, Luzerne county.

The Duquesne Steel works produced 20,600 tons of bar merchant steel in March—a new record.

Cows averaged \$82 each at the L. C. Swoyer sale at Centre Point. The highest price was \$124.

The Aetna Explosives company, at Irvingburg, Warren county, will employ 400 additional men.
