## 2,900 GERMANS ARE CAPTURED

Gauls Seize Entire First Line Trenches on Extensive Front; Teutons Pressed Back in Engagment Extending from Estrees to Heights of Vermandovillers.

PARIS, July 20—The French forces have captured the entire first German positions extending from Estrees to the height of Vermandovillers, according to the official statement issued by the war department tonight. They also have taken on both sides of the river about 2,900 prisoners in today's engagements.
