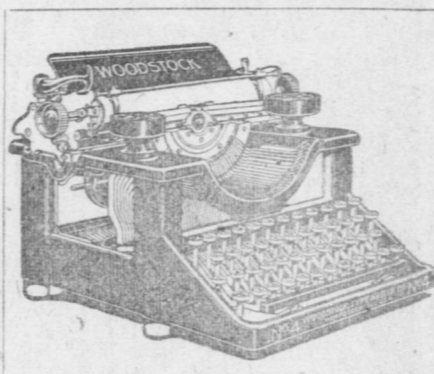

Interesting Items From All Sections of the State.

GULLED FOR QUICK READING

News of All Kinds Gathered From Various Points Throughout the Keystone State.

The Oil City commission council voted unanimously to pass on third reading the ordinance providing for the annexation to the city of West End borough, adjacent to the Fourth and Ninth wards of the city. It has a population of more than 1000.

Attorney General Brown announces that he has refused the petition of William Leslie for a writ of quo warranto to oust Mayor John V. Kosek of Wilkes-Barre on the ground that he is ineligible to succeed himself as mayor of a third class city.

The Lehigh & New England railroad which entered Nesquehoning several months ago, is expected to run passenger trains shortly between Nesquehoning and Tamaqua, while the Jersey Central will run to Tamaqua by way of Hauck and erect a new station at Hauto Dam.

Fayette county health authorities are alarmed over the discovery of anthrax among cattle in Youngstown and Mt. Braddock, near Uniontown. Within the last few days fifteen milk cows have died suddenly and as a result H. B. Mitchell, agent of the state livestock sanitary board, arrived to conduct an investigation.
